The nead of our firm in Seattle sent me word Saturday that he had 12 any more till the marke. eased a little The markets have been cleaned of the products of the western part of the state and now the calls for Yakıma spuds nave been numerous.

"There are 2000 tons of spuds stored n the warenouses in this city and bures parts of the valley. There are thousands of tong stored away by the farmers on their farms. With such a supply to draw from there should be some method about sending the slock to intrket. Whan ever, oody wants to snip and does snip the market becomes glutted. This causes . sudden drop in price and nobody gains anything. Whereas, if we could get together and ship in as the market demands we would in the end get much bester re-
