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HOUSE FURNISHERS AND UNDERTAKERS

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MOVING THIRD INFANTRY MAY CAUSE COMPLICATIONS

(Scripps News Association)

Washington, Feb. 23. International complications may attend the moving of the Third Infantry from Alaska next July and as the authorities do not just know what they may be "up against," they are preparing to hand the problem to some guileless contractor to solve the best he can. When the Third Infantry is moved, some other regiment must be sent to take its place and the Department is in doubt as to the best route for the new body of men to take. The White Pass and the Yukon route would be the best from a distance saving point of view. The attitude of the Canadian government, however, ought to be ascertained before our soldiers are sent marching across King Edward's territory. In order to find just what the Canadians would think of the idea, it would be necessary to unwind a tremendous amount of red tape. The State Department would have to be asked by the War Department to sound the

British foreign office. The British foreign office would refer the matter to the secretary for war. The secretary for war would pass the matter up to the secretary of state for the colonies, and the secretary of state for the colonies would then get busy and communicate with the Canadian officials, who in their turn would sift the question through a dozen selves. It would probably take until July before the answer would trickle back to the War Department in Washington. To take a short cut through the reel of tape, the War Department has decided to let the contract out for transporting the soldiers. The contractors who get the job will be required to give bond to the department that should there be objection to the transportation across the Canadian territory, the contractors will see to it that the troops reach their destination by some other route without additional expense to the government.

SUMMER DOCTORS WANTED

When City Folk Go Into the Country They Want the Urban Practitioner.

In all the sections of our common country in which the summer boarder or the summer cottager has struck his roots and come to be recognized as a factor in the economic life of the communities in which he settles, the question of medical attendance has become burning. Says the New York Times. The country doctor naturally assumed that he was to share in the prosperity of his neighbors and patients, the agriculturists, who "put" their products to the summer sojourner at from twice to ten times the local market. Visions of fees of \$1.50 per visit, instead of his customary 75 cents, began to flit alluringly before his eyes. But he forgot to allow for the fact that doctors as well as patients must survive. Not all city doctors go to Europe every summer. The lower sort go into the back districts of their own beloved land as cottagers, and in their villas there keep one eye open on the main chance. The urban practitioner prefers them to the rural practitioner. We will not undertake to say whether he is right, though at that point we entertain a decided opinion. At any rate the New Yorker, Bostonian, Philadelphian, in fact betrays in his rustication a preference for the urban practitioner. And the country doctor does not in fact, partake the benefits of the urban practice which iritates the rural purveyor of milk, eggs and "livery." Nay, more. The very country doctor's own rural patients in some cases exhibit a preference for the treatment of the visiting city practitioner. Not in many cases, and not in any case more than once, seeing that "three visits from a fashionable New York specialist, at city prices, would suffice to darken with a mortgage any farm in New Jersey or New Hampshire. But even without this aggravation the lot of the country doctor in the face of the annual city influx is hard, harder than it was before.
