POSED AS ARTIST'S MODEL.

Lady of Noble Birth Compelled to

A romantic episode has created quite
a sensation in Berlin's artistic cir-
cle. A year ago a young lady called
on a portrait painter in a western
suburb and offered herself as a model.
Her head attracted the artist who
engaged her, and she sat for several
pictures. One day she failed to keep
her appointment, and the artist had
not the faintest inkling of what had
become of her.

Painting in the Dark.

Artists are known to be often eccen-
tric in their methods; but Mr. H. Key-
worth Raine appears to have adopted

of an under-wood London center, and
there he paints portraits which are re-

curtains. Mr. Raine recently gave an
exhibition of his method at a London
hotel. On four consecutive days he
painted for an hour at a time in a
room which was almost dark, watched
eagerly the while by a committee of
literary, journalistic and art critics.
At the end of the four hours the light
was let into the room, and a fine por-
trait, full of power and originality,
was seen to have been produced.—

LABRADOR A BARREN WASTE

Impossible to Cultivate, But Its Wa-
ters Teem with Innumerable Fish
—Country Unpopulated.

The coast of Labrador is the
edge of a vast solitude of rocky
hills, split and blasted by the
frosts and beaten by the waves of
the Atlantic for unknown ages,
says the Boston Transcript. A
grand headland, yellow, brown
and black in its nakedness, is ever
in sight, one to the north of you
and one to the south. Here and
there upon them are strips and
patches of pale green mosses,
lean grasses and dwarf shrubbery.
There are no forests except in
Hamilton inlet. Occasionally
miles of precipices front the sea,
in which fancy may roughly shape
all the structures of human art.

More frequent than headlands
and perpendicular sea fronts are
the sea slopes, often bald and
lame, and then the perfection of
all that is picturesque and rough.
In the interior the blue hills and
stony vales that wind up from
among them from the sea have a
summerlike and pleasant air.

One finds himself peopling
these regions and dotting their
hills, valleys and wild shores with
human inhabitants, but a second
thought, and a mournful one it is,
tells that no men toil in the fields
away there, no women keep the
home off there, no children play by
the brooks or about around the
country schoolhouse, no bees
come home to the hive, no smoke
curls from the farmhouse chim-
ney, no orchard blooms, no bleat-
ing sheep flock the mountain side
with whiteness and no beller
lows in the twilight.

There is nobody there, there
never were but a miserable and
scattered few, and there never
will be. It is a great and terrible
wilderness thousands of miles in
extent and lonesome to the wild
animals and birds. Left to the
still visitation of the light from
the sun, moon and stars and the
auroral fires, it is only fit to look
upon and then be given over to its
primeval solitariness.

But for the living things of its
waters, the cod, salmon and seal,
which bring thousands of fisher-
men to its waters and traders to
its bleak shores, Labrador would
be as desolate as Greenland. The
time is now coming when, with
good steamship accommodations,
the invalid and tourist from the
states will be found spending the
brief but lovely summer here, not-
withstanding its ruggedness and
desolation.

Forty-Two-Story Hotel.

High life in New York may soon
mean existence in a 42-story hotel
whose head will be reared over 500
feet in the air, and which will accom-
modate 2,200 guests. The forty-second
floor will comprise a dining-room and
a ballroom, with roof garden above,
while the basement will be devoted to
Turkish bath establishment. Bor-
rows indicate that the best rock founda-
tions can be had at a depth of 30
feet, and there can be no question as
solidity; but structural problems
make a fortieth floor cost far more
than a fourth and these are not as
yet fully met.

Jackdaw's Ventures.

A pet jackdaw was missing in a
large machine shop near Kilmarnock,
Scotland, the other day, but was found
inside a large flywheel, after it had
circulated over two and a half hours
at 17 revolutions a minute. The bird
was unhurt.

THE SENSE OF SMELL

The Aborigines of Peru Have Devel-
oped It Wonderfully.

How infinitely minute must be the
particles that emanate from the object
which the dog is tracking, says the
London Mail. Yet the matter is ex-
tremely divisible. The tenth part of a
grain of musk will continue for years
to fill a room with its odoriferous par-
ticles and at the end of that time will
not be appreciably diminished in
weight by the finest balance. A cubic
inch of air rising from the flame of a
Bunsen burner has been found to con-
tain no fewer than 480,000,000 dust par-
ticles. A drop of blood which might be
suspended from the point of a needle
contains about a million of red fat-
tened corpuscles. Still, though matter
is so marvellously divisible, the olfac-
tory nerves are infinitely more sensi-
tive. Much has yet to be investigated
with regard to the differentiation of
the points in these nerves so that they
may discriminate with such apparent
marvellous accuracy. Yet even the
results in the scent of dogs show how
marvellously fine is their discriminating
power. Our sense of smell, unless in
the trained chemist, is not even so
acute as that of the semisavage. The
aborigines of Peru can in the darkest
night and in the thickest woods distin-
guish respectively a white man, a ne-
gro and one of their own race by the
smell. Much we have gained by civil-
ization, but not without some loss to our
bodily energies and senses. Man's re-
cuperative power after an injury is in
the inverse ratio to his social advance-
ment. Similarly he seems to become
less acute and delicate in the sense of
smell as he fares better and lives more
comfortably. The faithful dog puts
him to shame.
