RAILROAD FOR BEND

Either today or tomorrow a crew of O. R. & N. surveyors will pass through The Dalles on their way to Des Gutes and their advent into Eastern Oregon is most important. We have heard much about a railroad into the Bend country, and it looks very much as though we are about to have it, the O. R. & N. having a finger in the pie.

The Des Gutes has incorporated with a capital stock of \$100,000.00, and if the projected route following the Des Gutes river is found to be practicable, they promise to have 180 miles of road, from the mouth of the river to Bend, completed in about a year.

This road will be the longest feeder the Harriman system has pushed into Central Oregon. For seventy miles it will parallel the Columbia Southern, but will draw freight from a section too far removed to be served by that line. It will bear the same relation to the main line that the Columbia Southern and Condon and Heppner branches do, but will be twice as long as either of them.—Dalles Chronicle.

TO PROJECT W. & C. R.

Echo, Feb. 6.—Reports are to the effect that the Washington & Columbia River Railway company, who had surveyors in the field some months ago, are agitating the railroad which was talked of being built from a point a few miles from Helix to Stage Gulch, and north of Echo, entering town through a ravine near the flouring mill. It will then run on to Rhea siding on the Heppner branch Gooseberry postoffice will be struck, then through to the south fork of the John Day river near Spray, through to Prineville. It is believed that the road will be extended from there southward to connect with a road coming from California into Oregon. It is reported on good authority that some steps will soon be taken to carry out the building of this road.

DIAMONDS FROM THE SKIES

Meteorites in Some Instances Have Been Found to Contain Precious Stones.

Do the heavens rain diamonds? Blarrie as may appear Meydenbauer's theory that the diamond is of cosmic origin and has fallen as a meteorite at later periods of the earth's formation, here are evidences thereof, states the Chicago Tribune, the most striking confirmation coming from Arizona. Here, in a broad plain, over an area of about 10 miles in diameter, had been scattered one or two thousand masses of metallic iron, the fragments varying in weight from half a ton to a fraction of an ounce. There was little doubt these masses formed part of a meteoric shower, although no record existed as to when the fall took place. Curiously enough, near the center where most of the meteorites had been found, was a crater with raised edges three-quarters of a mile in diameter and about 60 feet deep, bearing exactly the appearance which would be produced had a mighty mass of iron struck the ground and buried itself deep under the surface. An ardent meteorologist in cutting a section of this meteorite found the tools were injured by something vastly harder than metallic iron, and soon announced that he had found black and transparent diamonds. Since this revelation diamond hunting in meteorites has occupied chemists all over the world; some of whom, like Sir William Crookes, have made a successful find. So look out for meteors. They may contain diamonds.
