REV. MOWER WILL SOON GO EAST

Will Exchange Pulpits With
Rev. Meredith of
New York.

Rev. B. F. Meredith, pastor of Grace
M. E. church, Wakefield, who is well
known in this city, a number of his pa-
rishioners residing here, will leave this
spring to accept a call to a little
town on the Pacific slope. Although a
small place and in a sparsely settled
region, the town is not separated from
the rest of the country. It is pleasantly
situated as no natural surroundings and
scenery.

Rev. Mr. Meredith is going to La
Grande, Oregon, where he will become
the pastor of the Methodist Episcopal
church in that place. La Grande is in
the northeastern part of Oregon, in a
valley of the Blue Mountains. It has a
population of some five or six thousand,
composed largely of miners, for the val-
ley and surrounding country are rich in
mineral deposits. It lies between Baker
City on the south and Pendleton on
the northwest.

The clergyman who has been filling
the position of pastor in the Methodist
church of La Grande, Rev. H. H. Mower,
will probably exchange churches with
Rev. Mr. Meredith, coming east and
taking charge of Grace M. E. church in
Wakefield, while Rev. Mr. Meredith goes
west to the La Grande church. Rev.
Mr. Mower will thus be under the New
York East Conference, while Rev. Mr.
Meredith will be under the jurisdiction
of the Idaho Conference. The Idaho
Conference includes all of the state of
Idaho and the eastern part of the state of
Oregon.

Rev. Mr. Mower is coming east to at-
tend the session of the New York East
Conference, which meets shortly, and it
is practically arranged that he will ex-
change with the pastor of the Wakefield
church. Rev. Mr. Meredith expects to
leave about the first or the middle of
March, but will probably finish his year
here before going west to take charge of
the La Grande church.

He presented his resignation to the
board of trustees to Grace M. E. church
last December and the trustees at the
time expressed their regret at his intend-
ed departure. Since then the regret has
been universal, for the pastor has made
friends everywhere and endeared him-
self to the church and congregation.

He has been pastor of the church for
three years, coming to Wakefield from
Meriden, Conn. where he was pastor
of a flourishing church in that city. It
is understood that the Ladies' Aid Society
of the church is planning to present him
with a gift on his departure, and it is
likely that he will also be given a farewell
reception by the church.

Unfortunately the pastor will be un-
able to take his wife and two small boys
with him to his new post, as the salary
would not enable him to do so. One of
the reasons that led Rev. Mr. Meredith
to decide on the change was that he has
been suffering a great deal while in
Wakefield from hay fever, but hopes to
become permanently cured by a residence
in the west. La Grande is particu-
larly noted for the efficacious effects of
its climate on hay fever sufferers. Rev.
Mr. Meredith's home while in Wakefield
has been in St. Owen's place.—Mt. Vern
Daily Argus.

Mt. Vernon is a city of over 21,000 and
we publish the entire article not only as a
matter of news, but it conveys some idea
of the general impression in which Oregon
is held in the far east.

Rev. Mower has only been on this coast
for four years, and finds that the health of
his wife and himself does not warrant their
living in this altitude, consequently the
change. While he has only been pastor
of the Methodist church in this city for
the past six months, he has very much
endeared himself to his congregation who
very much regret the necessity of his
leaving. Rev. Mower will leave about
April 1st, for his new charge.
