NOT A SUCCESS

There are several farmers in Umatilla county who are sorry that they adopted the government's method of exterminating "rust" in wheat, because the experiment has not proven a success and a great loss has been suffered by the farmers.

Formaldehyde is championed by the government as being superior to blue vitriol for "dipping" seed wheat for killing rust germs, and acting on the recommendations from the agriculture department a number of farmers last fall, decided to use the muchly praised substitute.

Either the chemical has failed to perform its function or the farmers who used it had not been thoroughly instructed how to apply it to seed wheat. At any rate,

the chemical has not only exterminated all the "rust" germs, but it has succeeded in killing the wheat itself.

Three or four farmers on the reservation are now busily engaged in re-seeding their summer fallow as a result of using formaldehyde instead of the old fashioned and reliable blue vitriol. One farmer, Ligk Davis, has been compelled to resow a 500 acre field, while other farmers are losers to nearly equal an extent.

It is believed that the cause of the killed wheat was that the farmers failed to dilute the solution sufficiently and had not strictly followed the instructions supplied them by the department of agriculture.—Pendleton Tribune.
