A LARGE CONTRACT FOR TIES

A contract for cutting 50,000 hewed ties has just been let by the Denver & Rio Grande Railway to Grider & White of La Grande, the ties to be loaded at Spring Spur, Glover, Kamela and Hilgard during the coming summer.

This is the first contract for hewed ties that has been let for many years in the Blue mountains and will employ about 50 men for the next four or five months.

The ties will be made from tamarack and red fir and it will be necessary to haul them from two to six miles to the railroad owing to the timber along the track being so closely culled.

The price is not made public but it is said to be under 20 cents each. There is sufficient timber to fill the contract on the holdings of a half dozen residents of the mountains on the east side between Hilgard and Kamela.

Work on the contract will begin as soon as the snow melts out sufficiently to permit the men to work in the timber.

OREGON BOY IN THE NAVY

In the class graduating February 12th at the United States naval academy, at Annapolis, is Midshipman F. M. Perkins of Salem. Mr. Perkins is the eldest son of W. T. Perkins, chief clerk in the office of the state treasurer. He was born at Umatilla, Oregon, June 3, 1887, but he had resided with his parents in Salem for a number of years, and received the greater part of his preliminary education in the public and high schools of Salem.

He received his appointment to the academy in September, 1902, and aside from maintaining a high grade of scholarship in the regular course of study, took an active part in athletics and other student enterprises. Boxing, fencing and baseball were the forms of athletics in which he took the most interest. While on the annual cruise last summer, he broke and held for a short time the midshipman's record for target practice, he having made 12 hits out of 15 shots in one minute from a six-inch gun on ship-board, at a target one mile distant.

Perkins will now be passed from a midshipman to ensign, and will probably be assigned to duty with the Pacific coast squadron, as he has made a request to that effect.
