VALUE OF SUGAR BEET TOPS FOR FEED

Mr. Clark Hill of Clo, Minn., recently expressed himself as follows in relation to the value of sugar tops for feeding cattle:

"The cream of the beets in the tops, the sugar is in the bottoms. Mixing the cream with the sugar makes a lovely cup of coffee. I am highly pleased with beet tops as feed, and my cows are more so than myself. If I offer them anything else than beet tops they turn their heads I will give the exact figures on 20 head of cows for six days in 1904, when I was feeding good corn stalks and grain.

"On Nov. 22, 1904, I sold 302 pounds of milk; November 24, 298 pounds; November 26, 276 pounds, making a total pounds for six days.

"On Nov. 22, 1905, I sold 542 pounds of milk; November 25, 542 pounds; making a total of 1,657 pounds, from the same number of cows, and they have not had a thing but sugar beet tops since the first of October, and they are still getting there, living on beet tops at this writing. I consider this a big profit when cheese is high, as I figure that I can afford to grow sugar beets, for the cows, as they come at a time of year when the cows need a succulent food to finish up the year with a good flow of milk, and when I get out of the beets is nearly all profit. I am highly pleased with the sugar beet crop, and as sugar is one of the necessities of life and one of the staple products, I am in the business to stay and can honestly recommend it to my neighbors and fellow farmers as a good and profitable crop, and a small patch of beets will not hurt anyone."

WATER USERS INCREASE STOCK

Hermiston, Ore., Feb. 9.—The East Umatilla Water Users' association will hold a meeting March 10 when the stock will be increased from 9000 to 20,000 shares. The increase will raise the capitalization to \$1,200,000.

Great preparations are being made for the meeting and a large gathering is expected. The association was organized to work in conjunction with the government in carrying on its large irrigation project in Umatilla county.

SUGAR CAMPAIGN

The campaign at the beet sugar factories, season of 1905-6, was a generally successful one, and most of the work brought to a close with January. Looking ahead, there is every indication of continued deep interest in this subject. Western factories are in many instances planning to increase their capacity, and there is work under way along this line in various states. A very large number of farmers have signed contracts to grow beets for the coming season, from Michigan to the Pacific coast. Meantime interest continues keen relative to federal legislation over the Philippine bill now in the house, looking toward reduced duties on sugar and tobacco.—Oregon Judd Farmer.
