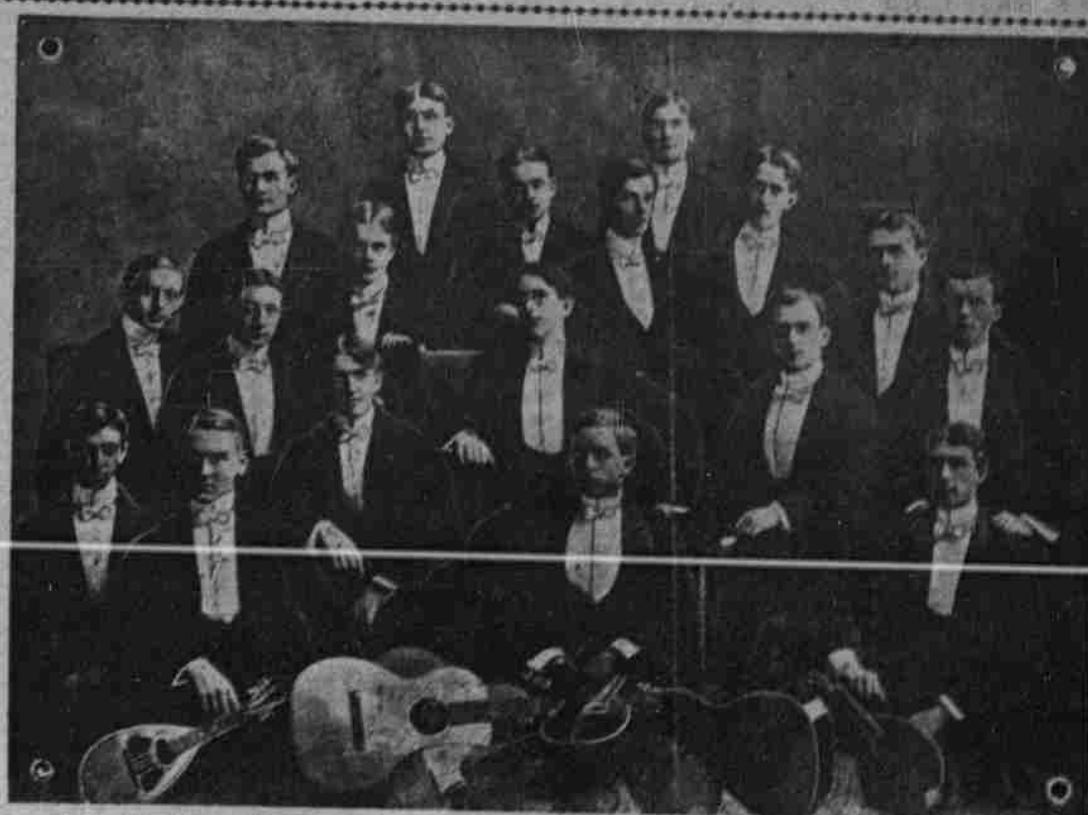

CIRCUIT COURT SESSION

The grand jury reported a true bill in the case of the State versus Sayers who was charged with larceny from a shop. The defendant was brought before the court and asked for further time in which to plead. He was given until tomorrow morning in which to prepare his plea.

In the case of C. C. Rockwell, charged with gambling in the city of La Grande the grand jury reported not a true bill, and the court ordered the defendant discharged. This is the case which City Attorney F. S. Ivankov ordered dismissed from the city recorder's court.

The case of Sigmond Penington was called and the defendant not appearing his bond was ordered forfeited and the district attorney ordered to collect the bond.

The court this morning set Wednesday as the time for the hearing of the case of the State versus Rohr. This is the case wherein Rohr is charged with rape.

In the circuit court this morning the case of State of Oregon versus Rufus Gaskill was again taken up and Constable McLaughlin was again called to the stand to testify regarding numerous articles of drugs and druggists' sundries. A few moments questioning was sufficient to establish the fact that the articles shown him were the same which he found in Gaskill's possession at Sumnerville at the time of Gaskill's arrest, and he was allowed to go. F. C. Forbes, the complaining witness, was then called to the stand and subjected to a rigid cross-examination at the hand of Attorneys Ivankov and Cochran who are defending Gaskill. The examination took the form of identification of the various articles which were found in Gaskill's possession. Articles were shown him regarding each and every one of which he was able to state that they were his. Much time of the court was taken up in listening to objections of the attorneys and at one time the objection business became so intense that the Court was compelled to remark that the dignity of the court would be best maintained if the attorneys would take their seats. This was done without objection by either party to the action. Much of the effect of Mr. Forbes' testimony was lost to the spectators and the attorneys also, from the fact that Mr. Forbes was unable to speak loud enough to be heard.

The attorneys objected to this, but the spectators kept their own counsel. The court finally suggested in an uncertain terms that Mr. Forbes exercise a little more lung force and the case continued with the usual drug package and the "one object" and "we ask for an exception." At twelve o'clock the court adjourned till one o'clock with Mr. Forbes still on the stand.

At three o'clock Mr. Forbes left the stand and Attorney Cochran moved to have the case non-suited on the grounds that the indictment was not sufficient and as we go to press the arguments are being heard on this feature.

She, prior to coming to this city, was a member of the Canadian Presbyterian church but never identified herself with any church here. It is an exceedingly sad case from the fact that two little babies are left thus motherless. Mrs. Stuart was about thirty years of age.

RESERVE POLICY

(Overseer Special)

Washington, Feb. 12.—In the rapid evolution of policy to be pursued by forestry officials in dealing with stockmen desiring range privileges on reserves, an important question has already arisen in Oregon. The supervisor of the Wenatchee reserves has given Washington sheepmen leases on portions of the reserves in Oregon, under the understanding that the Washington sheep were to feed there during the summer. Oregon sheepmen, protesting through the Umatilla county Wool Growers' association, assert that much of this range accorded Washingtonians has been used by them in the past by them in a predatory manner, and that the action of the forestry officials is perpetuating the wrong.

The effect of the present situation is that Washington men have a total of 174,255 sheep on the entire Wenatchee reserve, while the Oregon men have a total of but 26,750. There is said to be a total of 37,255 Washington sheep on the Oregon side, which is more than the Oregon people themselves have on their own side of the reserve. Sheep owners paying taxes in Umatilla county insist that they would use all of the Oregon side of the range, if but forced out.

Senator Fulton has been working with the department to change such a policy, and the case has resolved itself into a question of fact. The department, acting under the instructions of the Wenatchee supervisor, proceeds on an assumption of fact which is contradicted by the sheepmen. The result will be formal investigation to learn the real situation, as the Oregon senator intends to insist upon fair play, and will not be content with the mere statement of officials that their policy is adhering to the former range practices.
