BRINGS PECULIAR SUIT

John Girard of Blackfoot, Ida., has filed an action in district court against the Union Pacific Railroad company for \$10,000 damages. The complaint alleges that the plaintiff was taking the body of his wife from Blackfoot to their old home in Montreal, Canada, for the purpose of burial, and that when the train reached Green River, Wyo., a wreck occurred and the car containing the body, as well as the body itself, was destroyed by fire. The complaint further alleges that the accident was due to the carelessness of the employees of the company.

BODY OF FARMER FOUND

Frasno, Cal. Feb. 13.—The body of Henry A. Jackson, an aged farmer, was found spattered with blood on Sunday was discovered today in a railroad culvert a mile and a half from the scene of the crime. The head had been blown off with a shotgun. The surroundings indicate that two men were implicated and that robbery was the motive. There is no trace of the murderers.

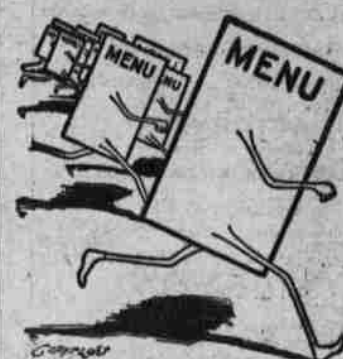
