GREWSOME FAD OF GIRLS.

Lively Young Milwaukee Women Shock Friend by Being Photographed in Funeral Array.

There is a set of lively young women in Milwaukee who have an entirely new fad—being photographed in a coffin. Growsome pictures of pretty girls laid out in garments of the dead are much prized in their collections, though they are extremely shocking to persons of nervous temperament and fine sensibilities.

A young woman who had been through the ordeal said that she had a friend who is an undertaker, and she had her picture taken in a shop lying in a casket lined with white velvet and dressed in white. The undertaker told her hands and feet placed in flower boxes around her, and she said when the picture appeared she did not notice that she and ever looked in a mirror, which may be one of the reasons why she prizes the picture so highly.

A friend of hers has pictures of what she calls her heroic group. One of them represents a sick bed with the patient weeping over the dying girl. Another represents a body just laid out, and the third is that of a young girl in a casket. The group is supposed to give a case of "nerves" to the men, hardened, particularly as the pictures are well taken, and from an artistic point of view, leave but little to be desired.

SALVATION OF THE FALLS.

Damaging of Niagara River at Lewiston Proposed by Eminent Engineer.

In "How to Save Niagara Falls" in the Technical World Magazine, Alton D. Adams suggests a unique plan for saving the falls from destruction by erecting a great dam at the mouth of the river. "For this great addition to the available power of Niagara river," writes Mr. Adams, "sufficient perhaps could be caused by such a dam to meet all demands during at least another century, it would not be necessary to divert one drop from the volume or detract one inch from the height of the great cataract. Neither could the existing power plants nor those under construction suffer injury by back water from the dam at Lewiston, for it is not proposed to raise the water level in that part of the gorge which is now just below the falls.

"In the lower gorge, between the whirlpool and Lewiston, the rapids could no doubt be reduced to smooth water by a dam that raised the river level 100 feet at the latter point. As the estimated depth of the whirlpool is now 400 feet the approximate effect of rise in the water level there could probably change its appearance to little. In the rapids above the whirlpool where the estimated depth is now only 40 feet, there might still be some rough water after the dam was erected, but their grandeur would be entirely buried. Having in view the fact that the rapids are now being used to divert more and more water to the upper river, it is perhaps not so much to say that a serious case of the rapids for industrial purposes is in the price that must be paid in order to save the falls. With the great development suggested at Lewiston, there could be offered no further diversion of water above the falls."
