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PRESIDENT MOYER, SECRETARY HAYWOOD AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEEMAN PETTIBONE ARE UNDER ARREST FOR COMPLICITY IN THE MURDER OF EX-GOVERNOR STEUNENBERG

HOLDING ANOTHER CONFERENCE

New York, Feb. 19.—An important conference was held here this morning in the Ashland house, between John Mitchell, president of the Miners' Association and Harris Taylor, a bituminous coal operator in Illinois. Taylor was the floor leader of the operators in the recent Indianapolis convention. The fact that he is now here has given rise to the belief that he is here for the purpose of reopening negotiations in the hope of securing an amicable agreement between the bituminous operators and the employees. Mitchell refuses to discuss the matter.

A MONKEY FUNERAL

A LIBERAL PARLIMENT

London, Feb. 19.—The new English parliament, the first session that has been in control of the Liberals for ten years was opened this afternoon. King Edward read his address from his throne, attended by the usual array of brilliantly uniformed officials. The king sympathetically referred to King Christain's death and commented upon the friendly relations among all the powers. He rejoiced that the war with Russia and Japan was brought to a satisfactory conclusion and that the negotiation was due to the initiative of the President of the United States which resulted in an honorable peace. The king hoped that the Algeiras conference would result in peace between the nations concerned.

On the subject of South Africa the king said in order to establish responsible government in the Transvaal, he had decided to recall his letters patent which provided for an intermediate stage of a representative government and would direct a new constitution granting a responsible government.

STORMS IS NO LONGER SECRETARY

Indianapolis, Feb. 19.—Daniel Storms, secretary of the state of Indiana, resigned his office this morning. This action was brought about by the governor having demanded his resignation. The demand was made on account of the governor having discovered alleged irregularity in the conduct of office.

Orchard is Said to Have Confessed and Implicated the Above Named Officers—Also says He Attempted to Assassinate Steunenberg on Christmas Night.

Boise, Feb. 19.—A special train bearing President Moyer, Secretary Haywood and Executive Committeeman Pettibone of the Western Federation of Miners, arrived here at eight this morning bearing the above men, who are charged with complicity in the assassination of ex-Governor Steunenberg of Idaho. Adjutant General Wells of Colorado, and Deputy Warden Mills of Idaho, and three Pinkerton detectives are guarding the prisoners enroute. No stops are being made between Denver and Boise.

The engines of the train were changed at sidings where there are no stations and water taken only at out of the way places. Fears were entertained that friends of the prisoners in Wyoming might endeavor to interfere through a habeas corpus. When they arrived the prisoners were taken to the penitentiary and no one was allowed to communicate until their lawyers arrived. A special grand jury will be called to return indictments to avoid a preliminary examination.

Harry Orchard, awaiting trial for the murder of Steunenberg, is reported to have confessed, implicating the three men arrested and three others whose names are being withheld pending their arrest. Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone were arrested only when it was learned that they were leaving Denver. Orchard has confessed that he attempted to assassinate Steunenberg Christmas night, but refrained on account of other members of the family being in range.

Orchard told where he had hidden his gun and cartridges. They afterward found them as directed. He is said to have attempted the assassination of the supreme judge of the Colorado court, but his bombs did not explode. The bomb was found where he said it would be. It

is said that Orchard claims to be converted to religion and has made a full confession, including the blowing up of the depot at Independence, Colorado, the murder of Mine Superintendent Collins at Telluride and the blowing up of the indicator in the shaft of a Cripple Creek mine, killing three men.

WITHOUT AUTHORITY

Denver, Feb. 19.—Without going into the merits of the charges of the complicity of the assassination of ex-Governor Steunenberg, of Idaho, public sentiment here is in favor of Moyer and Haywood because their arrest gives no opportunity to combat the allegations. Legal authorities declare that Idaho and Colorado authorities acted illegally and can be prosecuted for kidnapping for their action in forcing them to leave the state.

Wallace, Idaho, Feb. 19.—President Vincent of the miners union at Burke was arrested last night charged with complicity in the murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg. He is in jail this afternoon, but the time for his trial has not been set. There is great excitement here on account of the arrest. It is claimed that Vincent is not his real name. Those who claim to know state that his real name is St. John.

GO TO CRIPPLE CREEK

Denver, Feb. 19.—Three Idaho deputies, accompanied by several Pinkerton men, left for Cripple Creek this morning to make additional arrests. It is supposed that several prominent men are involved, and that a wholesale arrest is contemplated.

WASHINGTON NEWS

Washington, Feb. 19.—Senators Geo. C. Perkins of California and Thomas Patterson of Colorado announced in the senate today that they would be governed by the unconstitutional right to retain his seat.

This is suspension day in the House, the Littlefield's bill to prevent gambling in the territories is being considered. The House passed the Littlefield bill afternoon.

A joint resolution directing the interstate commerce commission to investigate and determine the relation if any between the oil trusts and the railroads and determine to what degree it controlled the roads, also to what degree of control the oil trust had in making freight rates, was introduced in the House by Campbell, Republican from Kansas. The commission was ordered to investigate the rates and practices of the railroads in the transportation oil from Kansas and Indian Territory to interstate designations. The hearing will be held in Kansas, March 12.

PANAMA CANAL

In referring to the canal question today the President stated that it would be noticed that the American engineers on the consulting boards and the board of commissioners by more than two to one were in favor of the lock type of canal, and that the foreign engineers were united against the lock system. The President is of the opinion that the lock type of canal could be built in half the time and at much less risk and it would be much easier to enlarge than if the sea level plan should be accepted.

FAILED TO ASSASSINATE

The state department was notified this morning of an attempt to assassinate President Reyes, of Columbia, on the tenth of this month. Eight shots were fired at him while in his carriage. The President escaped uninjured. The assassins escaped capture.

MARRIED CHORUS GIRL

HUNGARIAN PARLIMENTS DISSOLVED

Budapest, Feb. 19.—The Hungarian diet was dissolved today by order of the Emperor. A great display of military force was made, but there was little disturbance. Hungary will now be governed by an absolute regime similar to that which prevailed after the failure of the revolution of 1848. The dissolution of the parliament marks the culmination of a long standing quarrel between the crown and the leaders of the parliament over the recognition of Hungary's rights of liberty. Today's proceeding is the turning point of the destinies of the dual monarchy of Austria-Hungary and may lead to a revolution ending in the establishment of Hungary's independence.
