CHILDREN, ENURESIS, BED-WETTING

This is a disease peculiarly in the Osteopathic field. The failure of medicine to cure it is forcible proof of the long displacement as taught by the Osteopaths.

The most common form of enuresis is due to irritation of the sensory nerves to the neck of the bladder. In this state a small quantity of urine sets up the mechanism of discharge as does a large quantity in the normal state.

Now don't doctor the bladder, but doctor the point of irritation. This point is most frequently found in a slight twist of one of the pelvic bones. (This twist usually makes a difference of from one-fourth to three-fourths of an inch in the length of the legs, shown by the child lying on the back. This test must be confirmed by others.)

IMPROVE MOUTH OF COLUMBIA

(Observer Special)

Washington, Feb. 19.—In the list of states to receive attention this year by the Government appropriating power, Oregon will stand high. Every possible assurance that can be given quietly is enjoyed by the Oregon delegation that the very urgent work on the Columbia river will be continued. It is possible that the War Department, in conferring with the managers in Congress, will interpret this most urgent need as existing at the mouth of the river, but there is yet hope in the determined work of the two Oregon Senators for steady work on the Cello canal project. These two great projects on the Columbia have been championed early and late by all of the northern Oregon, southern Washington and northern Idaho interests, with the result that their details are familiar to all of Congress.

Senator Fulton is pressing the effort for a combination dredge on the coast, which would serve all the harbors of that section. An effort was made to divert him in favor of a contract dredging proposition, but he will not yield the plan for construction of a dredge for this work and expresses the hope that he will be successful this session. Light improvement will doubtless be authorized on the upper Columbia and Snake rivers. Construction of a light house at Cape Arago has been authorized by the senate, under Senator Fulton's bill, and favorable action is expected in the House. There is also assurance that the senior Senator will secure at this session the money required for the Federal building at Baker City, for which a site has been purchased, and preliminary arrangements made for construction.

Taken as a whole, the state has fared well for a bitterly economic session, and when final adjournment for the spring is taken, Oregon will unquestionably have much to her credit.

CITY ELECTION NOTICE

(a) Shall the said city of La Grande acquire the springs situated south of said city, known as the Falk Springs and the Schilling Springs, and pipe the waters thereof to the reservoir of said city, at a cost not to exceed \$12,000.

(b) Shall the city of La Grande retire the present outstanding bonds of said city, drawing six per cent interest, and in lieu thereof issue bonds not drawing to exceed five per cent.

UNIFORM DIVORCE WANTED

Washington, D. C., Feb. 19.—One hundred and fifty delegates, from nearly every state and territory in the Union, were present this morning at the opening of the "divorce conference." The conference seeks the enactment of a uniform divorce law which will be acceptable in every state in the Union. Governor Pennypacker of Penn., delivered the opening address, outlining the progress already made. A hearty welcome was extended to the delegates, but nevertheless there is strong opposition to the movement. Selva Lockwood advocated divorce without disfigure.

Governor Pennypacker was selected as the president of the conference, and Albert Dabney, of California, as one of the vice-presidents, and W. H. Staak, of Penn., secretary.

DEFECTIVE BILL

The proposed constitutional amendment to abolish free passes will not be voted upon in June from the fact that when the secretary of state went to examine it, he found the bill defective, inasmuch as it contained no enactment clause.

WORLD FEARS SUFFERING.

Since Advent of Anesthesia People Are More Afraid of Pain Than Ever.

The incident of a physician with a dislocated shoulder going from one doctor to another to get it set without an anesthetic and finally securing the heroic treatment at Bellevue is to-day so much out of the ordinary that it secures illud space in the newspapers. The fact that a painful operation was performed without chloroform or ether, says the New York Tribune, is itself thought worthy of notice. The refusal of several physicians to perform it is eloquent of the state of surgical practice.

Now and then in some doctor's office or medical museum we see a case of instruments which seem better fitted for the carpenter's bench or the butcher's block than for the surgeon's table. There are knives as large as carvers for cutting through quivering and sensitive flesh with free sweep and swift stroke as if it were dead meat, and great saws for covering human bones like firewood. The sight of them is enough to make one glad not to have lived in the old days. It is much more comfortable to be carved up now. If anybody doubts that anaesthesia was the greatest blessing of the nineteenth century to humanity, the threat of an amputation with these old instruments is likely to change his opinion. Out of the football field men now and then get joints dislocated and at once have them set without ether and rush back into the scramble. Battle and accident and disease still inflict untold suffering under circumstances which no anodyne can deaden. But in ordinary life, for the most part we have become so accustomed to relief from physical pain in surgical practice that the deliberate preference for endurance rather than oblivion excites interest and remark. Yet only a few years ago such endurance was a matter of course. To-day many people even to save their lives would not face the pain of old-time practice, so much have habit and the knowledge of surgical luxury affected us. Just as it is impossible for him who has grown into the life of ease and self-indulgence to take up the regime of early days when he worked with his hands and lived on hard fare, so it is impossible for most of us to face pain as our fathers and mothers did.

Some students of the Chinese tell us that their remarkable endurance of pain is not as much stoicism as lack of sensitivity. They do not feel pain as the "Anglo-Saxon" does. If that be true, it is easy to believe in great variations not merely in self-control, but in sensory responsiveness. Perhaps our people besides being less habituated to the endurance of pain as a matter of course, are also more sensitive to it, not only mentally, but physically. The modern nervous tension and quick responsiveness may lay upon the hero of to-day a vastly greater burden than was borne under the same suffering by the man of an earlier time, who was not braver or more self-contained or more the master of his own soul, but whose physical being did not vibrate with anything like the same intensity under external impulse.
