RESERVE TO RECEIVE ATTENTION
(Observer Special)
Washington, D. C., Feb. 22—Chief of the Forestry Bureau Gifford Pinchot, who has been away from Washington for a short time, promised Senator Fulton this week to take up personally the matter of allotting the Wenaha reserve for range purposes, as petitioned by the Umatilla County Wool Growers' Association. Incidental to this discussion, the general proposition of range apportionment on their reserves will be discussed.
The Senator is urging that local stock interests affected by reserve apportionment be given greater voice in the matter, and that when there is an issue of fact regarding any proposition, the department provide the means for hearing the case, and if the ruling of the supervisor is found erroneous or unjust to contiguous interests the chief of the bureau revise the primary allotment.
In this connection, it is the hope of the Oregon senator to develop a clearer method of procedure in range allotments, which, in the nature of things, is likely to be nebulous at such as the present early stage of the work. Developments of the Wenaha reserve seem to indicate that the department does not give the heed to local interests that is demanded by the states in which forest reserves are situated, and the first contest in the Northwest section may evolve a plan that will be of general benefit to stock owners.
