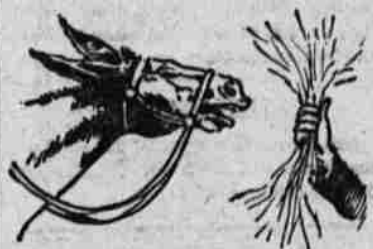
If my relationship to them, and friendship for them disqualifies me from holding any office in the gift of the people, I am ready and willing to step down and out.
