CIRCUIT COURT

The jury in the case of Lindey vs the Grande Ronde Lumber Company, where in the plaintiff sued for damages to the amount of \$20,000 for injuries received last summer, brought in a verdict for \$17,000. A motion was filed to have the verdict set aside and a new trial asked for. If this is denied the case will be appealed to the supreme court.
