OREGON ROAD LAWS

The last Oregon Legislature passed several acts pertaining to public roads, which it would be well if our people were to hunt up and read. Senate bill 162 appropriated \$500 to be expended under the direct direction of the President of the Oregon Good Roads Association in holding good roads conventions for the promotion of good roads in Oregon.

Senate bill No. 118 authorizes county courts in Oregon to improve county roads by graveling, draining, grading, planking, corduroying or macadamizing. This act is generally known as the Tuttil law. It provides that the resident owners of real estate residing within two miles on either side of a county road and one mile beyond the ends who wish to have it improved by grading, graveling, planking, corduroying or macadamizing can have the desired improvement done, expenses of the same to be paid by assessments upon the real estate adjacent thereto and benefited thereby, by a majority of the land owners of the county whose lands are within two miles of the road or improvement, presenting the county court with a petition therefor.

This law has been on the statute book since Feb. 22, 1905. It is quite a lengthy law and may be found on page 410 to and including page 421 of the general laws of Oregon passed at the legislature of Oregon in 1905.

The following item clipped from the Daily Journal of the 27th of Feb. will show that the people of Marion county Oregon are disposed to act under the law. "Silverton, Or. Feb. 27—Silverton is the first town in Oregon to take advantage of the Tuttil law for the improvement of roads in this vicinity. At the good roads meeting held in the opera house last Saturday, where more than 300 farmers and business men were present, it was decided by a unanimous vote of the meeting to build a macadamized road from this city to connect with the Scotts Mills-Mount Angel road, a distance of five miles. It is estimated that the cost of building will amount to \$15,000 and the work will be done by contract. The county court has offered to contribute \$1,000 a mile or \$5,000 and the balance will be raised by assessing property owners along the road as provided for in the Tuttil law, and by donation from the city. The city council has offered a good liberal donation and there is no longer a doubt as to the success of the movement."

If one half of the cigars that are consumed in this city daily were manufactured in our own city, it would require at least twenty cigar makers and this would represent quite a little weekly payroll. This is one way to help in building up our city. That is, be loyal to home institutions.

At this time of each year the question of better streets is always a topic of conversation. It might be well to consider that even before we can expect good streets in the business portion of the city, that a sewer system is the first step towards solving the problem and we will never have good streets until we have some means of conveying the surface water away.

GRAIN SHIPS COMING

The Oregonian of Monday gives a list of the grain ships enroute for Portland in which are 15 vessels with a total grain tonnage of 27,793 tons. Six of these ships bear the English flag, seven the French, one that of Germany and one the Italian. Not a ship owned by Americans was enroute for Oregon grain.

On that date there were four ocean going grain carriers in Portland with an aggregate grain tonnage of 5,996 two of these are English, one French and one Norwegian. There were no American ocean going grain ships in port.
