NEW BUT CORRECT POLICY

Milwaukee, Wis. Mar. 2.—Congressman W. H. Stafford has decided to deviate from the customary method of making appointments of Cadets for West Point from his district upon personal grounds and as mere favors, without regard for the fitness of the young men recommended. Under his direction the numerous applicants for such appointments will be submitted to a regular civil service examination and those showing the best percentage of points will be selected for appointment by him. The competitive examinations began here this morning at the civil service examination rooms in the Federal Building and will last two days. The competition is open to all young men from 17 to 21 years of age, who are residents of the Fifth congressional district.

GREAT DAY IN TEXAS

Austin, Texas, March 2.—Today is the seventieth anniversary of the declaration of independence of Texas, which was proclaimed on March 2, 1836. In honor of the day all public offices throughout the state are closed today, flags are waving from all public and thousands of private buildings and the citizens of the state are generally observing the day as a holiday. Special celebrations were held in nearly all the public schools this morning and in the afternoon there will be parades and meetings by patriotic organizations, with addresses by prominent speakers. A special celebration has been arranged at the state university.
As today is also the anniversary of the birth of Sam Houston, the great Texas patriot, special services will be held at Houston's grave at Huntsville by the students of the Sam Houston Normal School.

HUMAN HEARTS

Any play that teaches a great moral lesson is bound to do good to a community. Some of the greatest sermons ever preached against evil deeds and associations are embodied in the plays of the stage. The lesson of life is presented to the listener in

a way that makes an impression on the mind and gives him food for thought. While the spectator is listening to the text of the play, his visual sense is being attracted by seeing the scenes enacted before his eyes, that are being described in the words to which he is listening.

In such plays as "Human Hearts" which will be shown at Steward's opera house, Tuesday, March 6. The contrast between virtue and vice is sharply drawn. The author has not minced matters in drawing his characters, and as the incidents of the play are based on real occurrences, he has not had to draw upon his imagination to invent a motive for "Human Hearts."

The characters of "Jeannette" and "Frederick Armsdale" in "Human Hearts" should be carefully studied by everybody. We meet their prototypes in daily life, in nearly all large communities. How often do we see men and women, who, with all the advantages of education, comfortable homes, and the loving care of parents and friends still go astray, and sink lower and lower in the social scales until they reach the lowest depths of degradation. We meet them every day.

Another novel character drawing in this play is that of Jim Mason, a man born amidst the lowest surroundings with no advantage in early life, knowing nothing of the difference between right and wrong; a criminal because he has had no opportunities to be anything else. But here is a character that conspires to better things. The inherent instinct to raise himself above the level of his surroundings, is lying dormant, but, when the realization of the difference between right and wrong is brought home to him, he chooses the proper path.

PAPER FROM COTTON STALKS

The Denison (Tex.) board of trade is in correspondence with W. H. Groll of Pine Mountain, Ga., concerning the establishment of a factory for the manufacture of paper of all grades from cotton stalks. Samples of the paper made from the stalks have been exhibited there and show that the discoverer of the process has perfected a plan to make use of what has hitherto been a useless material.
