WINTMAN COLLEGE NOTES

Walla Walla, March 5.—Pres. Tormey of the Inland Teachers Association, which is to meet in Spokane, April 5th, and 6th, was recently in town arranging for the program for this year. This program will be arranged on a different plan from any which have preceded it. The various institutions of higher learning in the Inland Empire will be asked each to take charge of one hour. The University of Montana has been asked to discuss history of the Washington State College, Science; and Whitman College, Classics in the Public Schools. This association is the best and most important teacher's association in the Northwest, and this method of getting a program promises to bring out some exceedingly valuable discussions of these subjects.

Mr. Tormey also arranged for a song of old English folk songs, by Prof. T. J. Pennell, the head of the vocal department in Whitman Conservatory. Pres. Tormey has in mind also other plans for the entertainment and instruction of the teachers during the association, which will be announced later.

The girls' basket ball team played their first game of this season in the gymnasium Wednesday evening at 4:30. Their opponents were the ladies of the Faculty. It was thoroughly proven that dignity and experience are not elements of success in girls' basket ball, as the Faculty ladies only succeeded in throwing one goal in the twenty-five minutes during which the game continued, and that was an accident. This marks a renewal of interest of the girls of the College in the game of basket ball and may be attributed to the recent decision of the Faculty which allows the Whitman team to play games with outside institutions provided that the game shall be played in the Whitman gymnasium and that the spectators shall be limited to a list approved by the Faculty and no one will be allowed to be present whose name is not on this list and who has not received a special invitation. It is probable that several games will be played with teams representing high schools in the vicinity.
