## CITIZENS VISIT AMONG THE SPRINGS CHURCHES

Editor Evening Observer:

The undersigned citizens and taxpayers of this city, with a view to satisfying themselves to the actual amount of water flowing from the Falk and Shilling springs personally visited them this date and beg to submit their findings as follows:

Shilling spring No. 1 flows 5 gallons in 13 seconds.

In 24 hours this will amount to 33220 gallons.

Shilling spring No. 2 flows 5 gallons in 108 seconds.

In 24 hours this will amount to 4000 gallons.

Falk spring No. 1 flows 5 gallons in 9 seconds.

In 24 hours this will amount to 48000 gallons.

Falk spring No. 2 flows 5 gallons in 25 seconds.

In 24 hours this will amount to 18782 gallons.

Falk spring No. 3 flows 5 gallons in 25 seconds.

In 24 hours this will amount to 17280 gallons.

Falk spring No. 4 flows 5 gallons in 106 seconds.

In 24 hours this will amount to 4075 gallons.

The above six springs flow 125,567 gallons in 24 hours.

We were unable to hold all of the water, a considerable amount escaping, this with seepage etc., would, we have no doubt produce 150000 gallons each 24 hours.

We desire to say that we made the investigation in view of the conflicting reports as to the springs.
