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## SUSAN B. ANTHONY IS DYING

Rochester, N. Y., March 12.—Susan B. Anthony is sinking rapidly and is expected to die before night. She is now in a delirium and among her last audible words was to inquire of the work in Oregon where the battle for woman's suffrage is being fought. Mrs. Anthony was 86 years of age on the 20th of last February. Her energies have been chiefly directed towards securing equal civil rights for women and became prominent in her efforts for the abolition of slavery. In 1872 she voted in the congressional and state election of New York, for which she was arrested in order to test the constitutionality of the 14th and 15th amendments. She has lectured in almost every state in the Union.

## RUSSIAN PRIEST ARRESTED

St. Petersburg, March 12.—Father Gopen was arrested today. His arrest comes upon the eve of the inquiry into the charges, which he demanded, that the labor organizations had been subsidized by the government. The minister of commerce would exonerate him but his enemies claim the priest arranged the arrest to make the people believe the government is persecuting him. Elections for national assemblymen are being conducted in Moscow today. About a third of the factory hands refuse to vote, claiming the election is a farce and that the law is favoring the rich against the poor.

## THE OPIUM PROBLEM IN MANILLA

Washington Mar. 12.—The committee appointed by the Philippine Commission to investigate the opium traffic recommended that the trade become the government monopoly. Secretary Taft sent the committee's recommendation to congress today. The committee is of the opinion that high license does not restrict the use of the drug but only increases the temptation to smuggle. It would have the opium smokers register and finally have absolute prohibition and that only employees of the government of proven reliability be allowed to handle it. The committee further recommends the treatment of habitués wishing freedom of the habit; and the teaching of the dire effect in all of the schools and to prevent the growth of the poppy for opium production.

### KING'S WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

London, March 12.—Forty-three years ago on March 10, 1863, King Edward, then Prince of Wales, was married to Princess Alexandra of Denmark, daughter of the late King Christian of Denmark. Owing to the fact that the court is in mourning for the recently deceased father of the Queen, the celebration was devoid of spectacular features. During the day the King and the Queen received the congratulations of the members of their household, of the members of the cabinet, the members of the diplomatic corps, representatives of parliament, and various distinguished officials of the government. Messages of a congratulatory nature were received from all the European courts and the heads of various republics, including the United States. A special message of congratulation from President Roosevelt was presented to the King and Queen by the American ambassador.

In the morning the King and Queen attended special services in the court chapel and the rest of the day they spent quietly in the family circle. In the evening a family dinner was given at Marlborough House, at which nearly all the numerous members of the royal family were present.

Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, now King Edward VIII., married Princess Alexandra, eldest daughter of King Christian IX., of Denmark, in St. George's Chapel, Windsor, on March 10, 1863. He was then twenty one years old, while the Princess was nineteen.

### TRIALS OF CRUISERS

## THE COURT DENIES THE WRIT

Boise, Mar. 12.—Judge Steward of the district court this morning heard the argument regarding the writ of habeas corpus proceedings relative to Vincent, alias St. John, and Burk, the president of the Miners Union this afternoon. He took the matter under advisement. No indictments have been issued against St. John in connection with the Stunsberg murder. The supreme court this morning handed down a written opinion denying the writ of habeas corpus for President Moyer, Secretary Haywood, and George A. Pettibone and remanding them as prisoners in care of the sheriff of Canyon county until they are tried by the district court. The jail in which they may be confined is left to the option of the prisoners. The attorneys for the defence gave notice of appeal to the supreme court of the United States, and asked that time be given in which to prepare a bill of exceptions.

### MITCHELL ARRIVES
