The list will be larger, but it is doubtful if the interest will be any more intense. After the primary election, comes the real election in June, and then a much needed rest.

TWO CENT FARE POPULAR

Agitation for a two-cent railroad fare has spread rapidly over the states since the passage of the Ohio law and the voluntary reduction made by President Mellan of the New Haven road. Railroad officials of the east and west, according to advices received by the passenger traffic associations from various cities, admit that the 2-cent fare is bound, sooner or later, to become universal and they are only hoping the day of its general adoption will be delayed as long as possible.

The abolition of the passes and the belief that two cents is enough for most of the railroads east of the Mississippi in densely populated districts to charge are the two strongest influences in the propagation of the movement. Many railroad officials themselves believe they must offer the lower fare in order to meet the competition that is developing from the spread of interurban electric lines all over the country. The action of the railroads on the mileage book question is another thing that is operating to increase the demand for a two-cent fare.

In New York, fully a dozen bills have been introduced into the legislature looking to the enforcement of a two cent fare. One bill provides for a 1 1/2-cent fare. In Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island the legislatures probably will take no action on account of the action of President Mellan. Gov. Hanly of Indiana is determined that the next legislature, whether it be a regular or a special session, shall enact a two-cent fare bill into law. Candidates throughout the state for representative and senator are pledged on the question in advance.

The state of Iowa is also moving rapidly toward two-cent fare action. There is also a bill in that state asking for the abolition of passes to candidates for office, delegates to conventions and members of political committees.

I believe the public service corporation should be subject to governmental regulation and control. The power of regulation should be vested in the Interstate Commerce Commission, and should be exercised with due regard to the respective rights of the people and the corporation.

Trusts or combinations of capital organized for the purpose of controlling the utilities and necessities of the country, to the exclusion of legitimate competition, are contrary to public policy; in derogation to the rights of the people, and should come under the ban of the law.

I believe in preserving the dignity of our American citizenship and the freedom of the laboring classes of this country, and hence I am opposed to the admission of the coolie labor of China, and the undesirable classes of the Continental Europe.

The growing commerce of Oregon demands the deepening of the bar of the Columbia River; the construction of the Dalles-Celilo Canal; the opening of the upper Columbia, the improvement of Coos Bay, Tillamook and Yaquina harbors; the dredging of the Willamette and the Government ownership of the Locks at Oregon City and federal appropriations should be made securing these improvements.

A tariff should be maintained for the protection of American industries and American labor. Where, however, the necessity for protection is removed by the growth and development of a particular industry, the tariff should be modified to meet the changed conditions.

The reclamation of the arid lands is one of the pressing needs of the Northwest, and a condition to its greater development, and the efficiency of the reclamation service should be one of the first cares of the Federal Government.

The Federal Constitution should be amended to provide for the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people.

I am in favor of the establishment of the parcels post.
