TO THE PEOPLE OF LA GRANDE

Our forecast, so far as we have proceeded, has been carried out. This election was different, it did not go by default, it was not bitter and rancorous, it was a clean cut fair and square deal, the boys enjoyed the game, we showed you a good time, it was a good natured, friendly contest and yet it was warm enough to arouse enthusiasm.

No man asked me for a pledge or promise other than my voluntary published statements. I thank you for your hearty support and expression of confidence as evidenced by your votes, and I now feel justified in making you a pledge that I will not betray this sacred trust.

You have taken me at my word in the following declarations as gleaned from my manifesto: That we will pull unanimously for the up building of La Grande, the city of destiny, the metropolis of Eastern Oregon.

That the building of cities depends on the people.

That I am in favor of home industries

encouraging enterprise, beautifying homes and grounds, grading streets, establishing public parks, building churches, and colleges, and constructing sewer and water systems equal to the needs of a metropolis.

That I said I believed in building for the future and to put our mark high; to have electric roads, small farms and intensified farming and rapid increase of population.

That regardless of consequences, I stood for civil and religious liberty and being true to friends—and kindred and last but not least I said:

That, if elected, I will diligently fulfill the duties of the office to the best of my ability.

You took the forgoing as a platform and declaration of principles although stated in a style out of the ordinary:

TEXT OF THE PLATFORM

We, the Socialist party of the state of Oregon, in convention assembled, proclaim our allegiance to the Socialist party of America and affirm our unflinching adherence to the principles and program of the international revolutionary socialism. We base our appeal upon the following declaration as our platform principles:

1. Labor produces all wealth.
2. Labor's share is a mean and uncertain portion of its products.
3. The capitalist class appropriates products of labor by the private ownership of the means of production and distribution, by and through the wage system, being thus enabled to live in idleness and luxury.
4. An inevitable class war is created by the appropriation of labor's products.
5. The class struggle must continue so long as the profit system endures.
6. The most efficient and potent weapon with which the people can successfully oppose the capitalist class is the ballot.
7. If elected to any office the Socialist's one and only consideration shall be the working class—is this legislation favorable to the working class? If not, I am against it.
8. We declare in favor of the equal suffrage of men and women.
9. In conclusion, we appeal to all workmen to study the principles of Socialism, to vote with their class at all elections, until they overthrow the powers of capitalism and terminate forever the class struggle and inaugurate the co-operative commonwealth, based on the fundamental principle: "To every worker the full product of his labor."
