BARNEY HUGHES IN JAIL

Washington, D. C., March 16.—Barney Hughes, now in the district jail under a short sentence of imprisonment for drunkenness is celebrating his 108th birthday today. The keeper of the jail has permitted the old man to enjoy special privileges in honor of his birthday and Hughes is comparatively happy. Many persons have sent him gifts of money and delicacies. Hughes was found guilty of habitual drunkenness by a jury in the Justice Barnard's court about two weeks ago and notwithstanding his bold assertion, that he had not touched a drop of liquor for seven years, the old man was found guilty and sent to jail to sober up. Hughes remembers the war of 1812 with great distinctness.

A MEDLEY OF ARGUMENTS

A movement has been inaugurated by the Osteopaths in several States this winter to secure adequate legislation, which will give them recognition and protect the public from fakirs who have never been within the portals of an Osteopathic college; and the result has been an awakening of interest among the friends and foes of Osteopathic practice. In New York particularly, the papers teem with arguments pro and con, mostly in the form of letters from readers.
