NO BURGLARS IN NEW BANK

The Eastern Oregon Trust and Savings bank has installed a new and up-to-date cash vault in the building which is presently to be occupied by that bank. The safe is constructed so as to resemble a huge American cheese set on edge, and measures about three feet in diameter. The metal is manganese steel, a new composition especially adapted for safe purposes. The vault proper and the bed upon which it rests, will be placed near the front window, so that any attempt to dynamite it would result in blowing out the front of the building, and in that way attract more attention than if it was placed in the rear. The lock mechanism is very complicated. With these modern improvements the vault is as near being burglar proof as it is possible for human ingenuity to make it.
