TO THE NORTHWEST AND WEST

(Scripps News Association)

Chicago, Ill., March 31—According to statistics prepared by the railroad experts here there are now under way in the United States, 13,041 miles of new railroads and what are termed "live projects" provide for the building of 8,455 miles more.

At the opening of 1905 the record showed about 7,500 miles of road under construction, and about five thousand miles of this were completed during the year. It is said that two-thirds of the entire mileage now under way is being built by thirty-eight companies, an average of 231 miles a company.

For several years the Southwest has been the centre of the greatest railroad activity, but this year the centre has been shifted in part to the Northwest and West. The large projects include the St. Paul's 1,500 mile Pacific coast extension from Everett; the Western Pacific, of the Goulds, from Salt Lake City to San Francisco, 987 miles; the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific from Sulphur Springs, Col., to Salt Lake City, 470 miles, and the various extensions of the Hill and Harriman systems, the former with 784 miles and the latter with 545 miles.
