A CONFLICT IN OPINIONS

(Scripps News Association)

Washington, D. C., April 2.—There is a difference of expert opinion in regard to the proposed abandonment of the naval coaling station at Dry Tortugas. Rear Admiral R. B. Bredford, who is responsible for the establishment of the station there, is anxious that the transfer of the place from the Navy Department to the Treasury Department shall be opposed, while the naval general board has urged that the plant at Dry Tortugas be taken to Guantanamo. Secretary Bonaparte has advised the House Naval Committee that more than a million dollars has been expended on Dry Tortugas, and that it costs \$8,000 a year to maintain the plant. Some of the naval officers who have advised Secretary Bonaparte in the matter have pointed out that the place has now lost its strategic value and would be difficult to defend should an enemy seek to make an attack upon the coal pile in time of war. The naval general board is practically committed to a policy which insists upon the fortification of coaling stations, as well as the arming of the colliers. Mr. Bonaparte has advised Congress that the Treasury Department should reimburse the Navy Department for some of the expenses incurred in establishing the coaling station at Dry Tortugas, although, of course, only a small fraction of the original expense of establishment can be exacted, probably not more than \$200,000.

NAVY WANTS NO JUNK PILES.

The Navy Department is disposed to resist the plan of placing a limit of cost upon repairs of steel vessels. In the case of wooden ships this restriction equals ten percent of the cost of the new vessel, and any such rule applied to steel vessels would practically prohibit the current work of alteration, which may now be done on board the battleships and armored cruisers without special authority of Congress. The ten per cent limitation would interfere with all of the larger projects for naval repair, such as that recently recomplished on the Indiana, and new proposed for the Massachusetts at the Brooklyn Naval Yard. Rear Admiral Capps, the chief constructor of the opinion that the limitation should not be less than thirty per cent, and most of the naval experts believe that no special advantage is to be derived from having a limit of cost applied to repairs of steel vessels, unless, of course, Congress is willing to maintain a large "rotten row" and add new ships to the active service each year to take the place of those sent to the junk heap. The limitation is proposed as a provision in the next appropriation act, and if it is enacted into law it is likely there will be much embarrassment of the service.

STEEL TRUST MINES COAL

(Scripps News Association)

Pittsburg, Pa., March 31.—All the men who can be obtained are being put to work in the coal mines of the United States Coal Corporation, and the company expects to keep all of its plants running full time, regardless of strikes. Last year the company contracted with the Pittsburg Coal Company for 8,000,000 tons of coal a year for twenty-five years. This was to save working out its own holdings. It owns 32,724 acres of coal land, and in 1905 mined 2,204,950 tons of coal. Immense stocks of fuel have also been accumulated at all its mines and by the Pittsburg Coal Company.
