ONE MORE BANK FOR LA GRANDE

La Grande is to have another bank. The following well known citizens are the incorporators: Geo. B. Stoddard, Julius Roesch, W. B. Sargent of this city, and J. T. Donnelly and Wm. Pollman of Baker City. At this time, owing to the absence of several of the gentlemen mentioned above we are unable to state as to the exact location of the new institution, but it is evident that some desirable location will be secured. Four banks for La Grande speaks well for the confidence our business men have in the final outcome of this city. The new banking institution will be known as the Commercial National Bank, and will have a capital stock of \$75,000.

MEN ARE WANTED

Men are wanted by contractors on the extension of the Elgin branch of the O. R. & N.

Wages range from \$2.25 to \$2.75 per day according to nature of the work. Experienced rock and powder men are paid \$2.75 and \$3 per day, while common laborers are paid but \$2.25 and \$2.50. Board costs \$5.25 per week.

There are now nine camps along the grade of the Elgin extension, with a total of about 350 men. It is desired to secure 1000 men if possible in order that the 47 miles of grade may be completed as soon as possible.

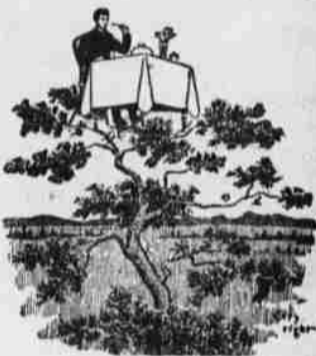
