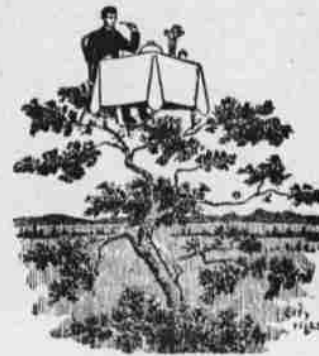
FORTUNE TELLERS ARRESTED
