CANNON SPEAKS ON TARIFF

Washington D. C., April 5—Speaker of the house Cannon, explaining a letter recently published in Ohio regarding the tariff said this morning: "Many people believe a single schedule or that of a few at least, may be amended. This is en-



tirely impractical, for an amendment to a single schedule might please the single interest, but could not command enough votes to enact it. Nothing can be done except to complete the revision which would be a compromise acceptable to majority of both houses. The enactment of such revision, and the time necessary to adjust business to it, would halt commerce for at least a year. I don't believe that the majority of the people want to interfere with the present existing conditions."

CAMPAIGN OPENED BY REV. TORREY

New York, April 6—The summer evangelistic campaign for New York will be opened this evening with a meeting in Carnegie Hall, in which the Rev. R. A. Torrey and Chas. M. Alexander will take part. This will be the first time they have been heard in this city since their return from abroad, and the meeting is expected to be highly successful. The demand for tickets has been enormous and it will be necessary to hold overflow meetings in neighboring churches. The speakers, who will address the Carnegie Hall meeting will also speak in the overflow meetings. The chorus of five hundred voices, which has been organized for this occasion, will be led by Mr. Alexander. Other musical features will be the Park Sister's Cornet Quartet and Prof. Raffasilli's Italian Orchestra of thirty pieces.

A SHREWD RULER

An amusing little story which is vouched for by good authority is circulating in diplomatic circles. According to the story an honorary Consul-General of one of the Balkan states had reached the height of his ambition; the sovereign in whose interests he acted, had conferred a magnificent order upon him. As the ruler in question is, however, in a chronic state of imbecility, it is generally left to those he deigns to honor to procure the richly jeweled setting of the order at their own expense, and the representative to whom the story refers, having no lack of funds, did not spare the diamonds. On a visit to the consul's city, the august sovereign who, by the way, is a connoisseur of precious stones, looked long and earnestly at the glittering constellation on the consul's breast, and graciously exclaimed: "My dear Mr.—! Your valuable services have not been sufficiently rewarded. You shall have a higher class of the order. Allow me to rectify the mistake this instant!" Whereupon the Balkanic ruler unclasped the real diamond star, coolly put it into his pocket and replaced it by another one adorned with imitation stones. The consul has now had a duplicate of his new order made. The one with the imitation stones he wears when the sovereign, who bestowed the order upon him, comes to honor him with a visit.
