FIRST DAY OF 1906 BASEBALL

This afternoon the baseball season has begun in earnest. The minor teams who play are Walla Walla at Athena. This is probably the one that will draw the most attention from local fans. Pendleton meets the Wallula Sage Brushers. Luck has been down on the Pendleton team because of inability on the part of managers to get suitable grounds on which to play. In the Pacific coast league Portland is scheduled to play Fresno at the latter city, Oakland at Los Angeles and Seattle at San Francisco.

OLD OXFORD LOOSES

London, Eng., April 7.—The Cambridge eight oar crew completely out did the representatives of Oxford today, by defeating their old rivals in the annual regatta, by five lengths. With one exception this is the most decisive defeat that has ever been administered to either of the crews. In 1898 Oxford won by twelve lengths. The course lies between Putney and Mortlake, where these races are held every year. Out of fourteen annual events, Cambridge has won six, today's race being the seventh.

WISCONSIN WILL PLAY FOOTBALL

After five months of the keenest agitation, the faculty of the University of Wisconsin have decided to allow football in the school. Many others of the Eastern colleges, it is stated, will also give in and allow the strenuous game, but in a modified scale.

One of the new things in the west is a boxing tournament which is being carried out at San Francisco. Amateur boxers from all over the country are signed, and the finals will be held tonight.

The La Grande team has received a brace, in Frank Betzel. He comes from Wisconsin and has a good record as a twirler in the East. Manager Heisner has made it possible for him to accept the position on the team by way of securing for him a position in the city where he can work when he is not playing ball. Tomorrow will be a day of loosening up and a practice game will be played by teams from this city. No one will be allowed to make any records but an easy try-out is planned. Fans should not forget that a two-bit donation will help the local team immensely.

The subscription list must be kept in the dark and the only way to do so is to attend these practice games. The club is nearly a hundred dollars behind and this amount must be made up at once. La Grande is going to establish a new record this year in not having any fund to work with other than that which will be received at the gate. Other teams in the country have a generous fund given them by business men but a big attempt is being made here to raise the fund by gate receipts. Be on hand and help the boys.

Elgin is to have a tennis team this year according to the Elgin Recorder, which states that lovers of the gentle game have organized and are thinking of preparing a new court in connection with the one they already have.

Fresno has captured Portland's business manager, J. H. Higgins, and he will now have charge of the Fresno team.

The game opened at San Francisco with ideal weather and a large attendance. Prior to the game, both teams paraded the streets in automobiles. Hit will pitch for San Francisco, while Vickers will be in the box for Seattle.

BUTTE TEAM COMING HERE
Manager Al Heisner is in receipt of a letter from Manager McIntyre of the Butte baseball team. Butte has just entered the Northwestern league and their manager has written here inquiring into the possibilities of bringing his team here early training. He will bring in the neighborhood of twenty men and as they prove inefficient he will release them. McIntyre also requests that he have games with the local team.
