DOWIE HEADED FOR ZION

(Scripps News Association)
Laredo, Tex., April 7.—"Apostle" Dowie entered the United States this morning, not in a private car because none was available. When the train stopped at the International bridge for inspection, a crowd of newspaper men were met at the door by attendants who would not permit them to come in close contact with the "Prophet." It is said that Dowie's strength has increased under the opposition that now confronts him upon his arrival at Zion City.
After Dowie's train left Laredo, he admitted correspondents and decided to them as well as denounced, the charges of his wife, his son and the overseers. "I will drive my son and wife from the city of God. I have been true to every trust and am only answerable to God." The apostle went on to say: "The charges are foul mouthings of inverte curia. The acts of the receivership curtailing my commands are illegal and will be punished in civil courts as well as my right hand. They say I have lost millions of dollars in Wall Street speculations; it is a lie. The letters purported to be written by me are fictitious and the real creators shall be punished by imprisonment until the charges be publicly refuted." Dowie stated with much vim that in two weeks he would be again Zion's leader, and be accepted as a man of God and not as a charlatan.

CANDIDATE WITH AN OPINION

Hon. John H. Aitkin Speaks Plainly for Change in Law Governing State Deposits.

Portland, March 31.—Looking hearty, smiling and confident as ever, Hon. John H. Aitkin arrived in Portland this week from his Huntington home and will remain here some weeks. He is president of the Oregon Commercial Company, the leading mercantile institution of Eastern Oregon; president of the bank of Huntington; has been three times mayor of his city, and is a leading factor in the industrial developments of Oregon. In matters effecting the growth of the state he has always occupied a prominent part during his 18 years residence.

Somewhat reluctantly Mr. Aitkin finally consented, at the solicitation of thousands of friends, to stand as a candidate for state treasurer at the Republican primaries. His canvass has been an earnest one yet devoid of all bitterness, for he has naught but the kindest expressions when referring to his five competitors.

In an interview in the Oregonian Mr. Aitkin places himself decidedly upon record as favoring an immediate change of the law now governing the state treasurer. At present the treasurer not only draws his salary of \$4500 per year, but is also allowed to deposit the surplus funds of the state where he pleases and to pocket the interest on these huge deposits. Mr. Aitkin in the Oregonian declares emphatically for a change in this system so that a board, consisting of the governor, secretary of state and treasurer, shall decide where these deposits shall be made and that the interest on these shall revert to the state and not to the extra compensations of the official.

This is a radical innovation along the lines of true public trenchment. It has a ring of genuine sincerity and is making Mr. Aitkin thousands of earnest friends among all classes who hold faith to the public higher than mere graft. His platform is simplicity itself. He merely tells the people that if elected he will give the office a straight, honest, business administration and that every person shall have a square deal. "The office shall be conducted in the interests of the whole people in our state."

Almost 6000 voters of Oregon have already signed Mr. Aitkin's petition which will be filed within a few days. In this portion of the state his popularity is growing rapidly every day and although there are five aspirants for the same office in Portland and the Willamette valley it now seems certain that he will lead the entire list.

CITY IN NAPLES COVERED

London April 7.—A dispatch just received says that the city of Bosco Tre-Case in Naples has been destroyed by lava from Vesuvius. Bosco Tre-Case is situated on the southern declivity of the mountain and contains a population of about 10,000 and is nearly contiguous with the city of Torredell-Annunziata a city of about 30,000. At this time whether or not any lives were lost is not stated but as the city has been in great danger for the past two days it is natural to suppose that the inhabitants escaped.
