RECEIVING GREEK CULTURE

Dressed in his native costume of turban, belt and loose garments, George Heraklides an Arabian, passed through here this morning on his way to Hot Lake. NO MUD-SLINGING

Fair Treatment of Other Candidates—Ivanhoe's Supporters United

An OREGON reporter met Col. Ivanhoe on the street today, and inquired about his campaign for District Attorney. He seemed willing to be interviewed, and went hastily over the situation. He has carefully canvassed both counties, and his judgment is based upon an actual inspection of the whole field. Speaking of his supporters, he said:—"I have had the opportunity of talking personally with most of my old time friends and clients, and loyalty is in keeping with what I expected. They are united and perfectly confident of my nomination. They make up the great bulk of the party in both counties. They



take no stock in the cheap attempt to array one section of the district against another. The universal sentiment is to place the most suitable man on the ticket for all offices and make the test of experience stand above that of experiment." In referring to the methods of campaign, the Col. said:—"I am making no criticism of any man's campaign. He must be responsible for that himself. I am opposed to unfair methods or untruthful statements. I will not, even by newspaper insinuations, resort, whether provoked or not, to the level of the mud-slinger, or any form of scurrility. No, I will not even attempt to be funny. I am running upon my merits, if I have any; and if I have none, I should not be nominated. I am appealing to no class or section, and if elected to the office of District Attorney, I will not be the district attorney of any class or section, but of the whole district, and for all the people. I would rather treat all parties right, than to mistreat any one. If my long practice among the people of the two counties is not sufficient guaranty of my merits, I know of no way, and do not desire to deceive them. Personally, I have little to offer in the way of a method for a campaign, only that I do not desire an untruthful statement made of either myself or any one else; and hope all will use what they know, and investigate what they hear, in arriving at a choice. If elected, I shall use my best ability to so enforce all law, as to lessen crime and public expense. I can't promise to do more."
