Today is a memorable day in the history of this country. Just 131 years ago the shot was fired at Lexington, which was heard around the world, and just forty-five years ago today Baltimore was the scene of an important event in the history of the United States, the attack upon the Sixth Massachusetts regiment as it was on its way to Washington in defense of the Union. There are still quite a number of persons living today who remember that April 19th, nearly half a century ago.

The country was in a turmoil then. Fort Sumter had been fired upon, the federal government had called for volunteers to put down the rebellion and the stars and bars had been run up to replace the stars and stripes in many of the Southern states. Baltimore was a hotbed of secessionists then and when the Washington authorities attempted to pass armed men through the city, there was trouble.

On the morning of April 19th, the 6th, Massachusetts Regiment and portions of the First and Second Regiments of Pennsylvania troops started across the city. They were greeted with hoots and jeers and showers of missiles were hurled at them by the immense throng of southern sympathizers. A soldier's gun was accidentally discharged, the mob made an assault and the soldiers fired a volley. Four soldiers and twelve citizens were killed and thirty-six soldiers and a great many citizens wounded.

The California horror has affected the entire nation, Oregon especially feels the great calamity that has befallen the metropolis of the Pacific coast. Thousands of our people have relatives and friends or have personal acquaintances visiting San Francisco, which brings it closer home. Yet we can not realize the awfulness of the situation. Thousands are known to be dead and doubtless there are scores and scores who will never be heard of again. Hundreds of happy homes were shattered in the twinkling of an eye. Men who were rich yesterday are today paupers. It is the greatest calamity that has ever visited any section of the United States.

The earthquake which did considerable damage in California in 1892 covered a period of several days and it will be quite awhile before the people will recover from the resent shock, provided the worst is now over.

Tomorrow is primary day and each voter should go to the poles and register a choice for his party candidates. Good men cannot be placed in office at election time unless we see to it that only good citizens are placed in nomination the 20th.
