possible to relieve the suffering. The people are fairly comfortable but the heavy fog is causing much distress, especially to the women and children who lost everything but their night clothes.

TRAINS FROM WASHINGTON

Washington, April 20.—A special train of twelve express cars chartered by the government, left Washington this morning laden with stores collected here. General Bell arranged for right of way over all trains. This train is expected to make a record on time. It is loaded with eatables, tents, stoves and commissary supplies. An effort will be made to reach its destination in three days. The President has designated Secretary of Labor Metcalf to act as an escort as a personal representative to visit San Francisco and ascertain what relief the government can offer.

Washington, D. C., April 20.—The war department continues to receive appeals for relief from persons who live in the immediate vicinity of the coast forts. They complain that the peace and quiet of their habitations are disturbed, and that the shock or jar that attends the firing of the big guns contributed to the discomfort of the neighbors of the coast defense works. The war department always takes these complaints under advisement and submits them to the artillery officer locally interested. In every case it has been shown that the complaints have come from people who have taken advantage of the bargains offered in real estate located close upon coast forts. They get the land cheap because it is within the zone of sensation, so to speak, of the big guns when they are fired. The guns must be kept in practice, and there must be firing at the target at the periods prescribed by the war department authorities, and complaints make no difference in the scheme of maintaining the efficiency of artillery fire.

PENDLETON SENDS RELIEF

(Observer Special)

Pendleton, Oregon, April 20.—The citizens of this city circulated a subscription list this morning in behalf of the San Francisco sufferers. Before nine o'clock thirty-five hundred dollars in cash had been subscribed and collected and will be forwarded immediately. As the day proceeds additional money is being secured.

TENDER NECESSARY AID

The legislature of Illinois and the governor of Indiana tendered aid to California the former appropriating \$100,000.

FIRE IS CHECKED

Washington, April 20.—General Funston wired the department that the fire is partly checked.

LIFE LOSS LESS

Oakland, April 20.—The general belief is growing that the life loss will not exceed 500. 100,000 refugees are located on this side of the bay and have notified the dealers that if they are caught raising prices, their supplies will be confiscated by the authorities.

GRAND CHANCELLOR CALLS

Chicago, April 20.—Grand Chancellor of the Knights of Pythias, has issued a call for contributions to aid the California brethren.

WANT BREAD

Mayor Schmidt has appealed to the governor of the state to put all of the bakers in the state at work making bread.

TO AID THE BANKS

Banks throughout the country are guaranteeing to support the San Francisco banks so that the depositors will not lose a cent.

Soldiers are guarding what few grocery stores that escaped the fury of the flames in the outlying sections of the city.

ROCKEFELLER GIVES \$100,000

New York, April 20.—The Standard Oil Company today duplicated John D. Rockefeller's contribution of \$100,000 for the sufferers.

PROPERTY LOSS

The property loss in the city of San Francisco is now estimated at \$200,000,000.

OVER ESTIMATES AT SAN JOSE
The loss of life at San Jose was over estimated, so far only ten bodies have been recovered.

General Funston wires the department at Washington that the situation is far better than he thought and he expects to

save the region in the city from about Fillmore and Market on regular to Van Ness and Broadway and north of Market street. The weather is fine. Supplies are beginning to arrive.

Oakland April 20.—As near as can be ascertained at this time there are only five deaths as a result of the havoc wrought in this city. What few fires there were are now under control and most of them are out.

Oakland April 20, 2:30 p. m.—The only water in San Francisco is being distributed by the soldiers. Mineral water is selling at five cents a glass; crackers at ten cents each; bread at one dollar a loaf and one loaf of bread and a box of sardines for \$3.50.

The authorities are confiscating every bit of provisions that they can find and issuing it to the people in the same proportion as army rations. Many people find it hard to accustom themselves to the army ration.

RICH AND POOR ALIKE

The rich man and the poor man are working side by side digging trenches for the dead. Some objected but the relentless discipline of the troops know no distinction and are forcing all able bodied men to work at least one hour.

DULUTH RAISING MONEY

Duluth, Minnesota raised \$6,000 in five minutes at a mass meeting and twelve millionaires guaranteed to make \$50,000 within twenty-four hours and they immediately wired Governor Pardee \$25,000.

The rumor that a tidal wave has struck San Diego has so far failed to be confirmed. Neither has there been any damage in Los Angeles.

UNION COUNTY ELECTION

The election is progressing quietly but actively in this city, there will be a large vote polled in the five precincts. The following reports are from the county.

ALICEL

At 1:30 only five votes were registered. The farmers are coming in and the vote may be large before evening.

ISLAND CITY

At 1:45 the registered vote shows 25 cast. The farmers are not showing up and the votes seem to be only the townspeople.

SUMMERVILLE

Farmers are beginning to come into town at one thirty. 20 votes have been cast. Indications are that the vote will be heavy.

COVE

At 1:45 the farmers are coming into town and indications point to a fairly general vote.

At three o'clock the vote at Cove stood Republican 71; Democrats 69.

UNION

At three o'clock the primaries were in full blast. The rural vote seems to be heavy. The town is full of farmers and ranches.

ELGIN

A three five about two hundred votes have been cast, possibly two fifty. It is not thought that the total vote will run up over four hundred fifty or five hundred. Farmers and milmen are beginning to arrive.
