CENTRAL RAILROAD RUSHING

The Central people are pushing work on the grade as fast as possible, and have about five miles of grade completed. It will be only a short time until the grade is completed to Cove.

A complete grading camp has been established, tents having been erected for both men and teams with complete boarding accommodations.

A crew of about forty men and from twelve to fifteen teams are employed on the work at present, and the work is progressing rapidly.

It is thought that cross ties will begin to arrive on the grade in about two weeks. Several tie contracts have been let, and the company will let more as soon as details can be arranged. The timber used is fir and tamarack mostly, though some black pine is being accepted also.—Union Republican.
