**THE 'QUAKS
SEEN BY
MRS POOL**

The following letter from Mrs. Emma Pool, to her brother, J. W. Scriber of this city, gives a good idea of the truly terrific conditions existing at San Francisco during the earthquake period. Mrs. Pool was in the city at the time of the earthquake on her way home from New Mexico where she had spent the winter for her health.

Spokane, Wash.
April 27, 1906.

Mr. J. W. Scriber,
La Grande, Ore.

Dear brother:

We are here, Emma and I, trying to rest up from the earthquake. We were lots more fortunate as we saved our trunks, at least they are to be forwarded soon, but I feel the need of them very much, but I am thankful we escaped with our lives. Our building stood the earthquake fine, lost some plaster and the stone was damaged but went down in the fire. I surely thought my last days had come when I was aroused from a deep sleep by the building swinging and rocking in all directions with a noise like thunder, creak of building, falling plaster and etc. I surely thought the building would go down and thought I stood as good a chance on the bed as any place. As soon as the worst of the motion was over I jumped out of bed and carried Emma down 4 flights of stairs and was the second one out. For once the Scribers were swift. Needless to say I did not have any clothes on and but for the kindness of a young man who went to his room on the first floor and got a sweater for Emma and gave me his coat, we would have suffered from cold. Later I screwed up my courage and went up and dressed, packed my trunk and brought Emma's things down and dressed her there. We did not get any breakfast and about ten got an express wagon to haul us and trunks to Miss Charles, a cousin of Mae McClaines. Mae and her mother, Mrs. Underwood, Margaret and little Dolph were with me. We all went out there and while we did not suffer for anything as they had water in the house and we had enough to eat of beans and corn with sardines and canned stuff, but no bread or crackers. From where we were, we had a good view of the fire. The first night we could not sleep for fear of an earthquake and the second, the fire was so near. We did not know but we would have to move at any minute. Fortunately it was gotten under control just three blocks from us and Friday we got a man with an old sand wagon to haul us to the ferry and we felt for home arriving Sunday morning. Mother had been terribly worried and was so relieved when my telegram arrived about ten minutes before I did. Trusting everything is progressing favorably with you. With much love to you, Ella and children.
