walls and some chimneys there is no
damage here. The University of Cal.

Francisco.

I was in the latter place yesterday
and must say the devastation is appalling.
The keenest imagination could not get
any idea of the disaster without seeing it.
I am going to Yosemite in a day or two
and soon will come back here. I expect
to start east in a week or ten days.
