DEATH OF MISS ROBINSON IN CHINA

Mrs. Helen R. Walker, of East avenue received the intelligence on Tuesday by cable of the death of her sister, Miss Mary Robinson, at Chinkiang, China. Miss Robinson had been ill for several weeks with pleurisy, which terminated in pneumonia, causing her death last week the actual date not being mentioned.

Miss Robinson was a teacher in a mission School, under the Methodist Board and had been in China for 22 years. Mrs. Walker knew of her serious illness, but was hopeful, as were her co-laborers, that she might be spared to come to this country for a rest and to recuperate. Mrs. Walker was planning to meet her in California and together remain there until strength was restored. The news of her death has come to her, therefore, as a sad blow, as they were deeply attached to one another, and her frequent letters were a great comfort and pleasure to Mrs. Walker.

Miss Robinson's whole heart was in her work, that of educating and christianizing young Chinese women, and her wish was gratified that she might live and die among them and be faithful to the cause so loved. She was a very capable, accomplished woman, and her loss to the School is incalculable. Besides Mrs. Walker she is survived by two brothers, Charles, of Battle Creek, Mich. and Arza of Marshall, Mich. and a sister, Mrs. Della Scott, of La Grande, Oregon. The Caledonia Advertiser.
