VINEGAR PLANT FOR LA GRANDE

Mr W. F. Ripley of Denver, who has had twenty years experience in the manufacture of apple products and is a professional vinegar and wine maker, has been quietly investigating the resources between Boise City and Portland since Feb. 23d with a view to establishing a plant to work up the cheap and surplus fruit. Mr. Ripley has just returned from the coast and has decided that La Grande offers the best opportunity for business of this kind. Taking into consideration the large acreage of apples here and with the export trade in view the coast points from Alaska to California offer almost an unlimited market. Goods can be marketed as far east as Chicago.

A factory of sufficient capacity to handle the fruit in this section will require the co-operation of every fruit grower and business man in La Grande. Those who are acquainted with the proposition are enthusiastic over the subject and a meeting has been called for eight o'clock tomorrow evening at the Commercial Club. To secure this plant in time to operate on this year's crop fruit growers and others interested should not fail to be present.

LAND OFFICE BUSINESS

HILGARD RESIDENT ASSAULTED

The preliminary trial of Mike Carney of Hilgard who was arrested on a charge of assault Friday night was held this morning, and disclosed some startling facts. The evidence showed that the defendant had approached the house of Harry French a poor man living in Hilgard, and battered down the door with a rock. Gaining admittance in this way he assaulted the old man, kicking him, jumping on him with logging boots, and in every way possible battered and pummeled the old gentleman. Following Carney's arrest, the authorities here sent medical aid to Mr. French, and Dr. Hall testified this morning that the injuries inflicted were very severe, and considering the advanced age of Mr. French, who is 77, it may be some time before he can appear to testify in his own behalf. During the trial Carney pleaded not guilty, but admitted that he was very drunk at the time. He was bound over to the June term of court on a charge of aggravated assault, and bail fixed at \$500. As no one offered to raise the necessary amount he was lodged in jail.
