NATIONAL MANUFACTURER'S CONVENTION

New York, May 14.—Hundreds of delegates to the National convention of the National Manufacturers' Association which will be informally opened here this evening, have arrived in this city and every train brought more from all parts of country. The convention will only last two days and will conclude with a big banquet at the Waldorf Astoria. The attendance will be greater than at any

previous convention and the sessions promise to be of unusual interest. Many matters of great importance will be considered and a large number of prominent members will deliver addresses. One of the most important matters to be considered is the position which the association is to take in regard to the tariff question. It is expected that a number of tariff changes will be recommended by the convention.

EXPLOSION FELT TWENTY MILES AWAY

Bridgeport, Conn., May 14.—Four powder magazines of the Union Metallic Cartridge Company exploded this morning and two others wrecked. The contents of the latter were uninjured. The explosion shook the country for twenty miles around and did much damage to buildings near the factory and people thought an earthquake had visited the city. The magazines were located four miles from the city but people were thrown from their beds and farm houses demolished.

COLUMBUS PURE FOOD SHOW

Columbus, Ohio, May 14.—The annual Pure Food Show under the auspices of the Retail Grocers Association of Columbus opens here tonight at the new Memorial Hall. It will last two weeks and is on a much larger scale than any previous show of that kind ever held in this city. The attendance promises to be very large, as more than 150,000 tickets of admission to the hall have been distributed among the grocers of the city, to be given away free of charge to their customers.

CARL SCHURZ DEAD

New York, May 14.—Carl Schurz, the statesman died in this city this morning at the age of 77. No definite funeral arrangements have yet been made but it is likely it will take place Thursday. Carl Schurz came to America from Germany in 1852 and in the memorable campaign between Abraham Lincoln and Stephen A. Douglass he gained his reputation as an orator and for his services when elected president, Lincoln made him minister to Spain, which position he resigned 1861 to accept a commission in the Civil war, and acquitted himself with honors. In 1867, he moved to St. Louis and edited the Post, and was elected United States Senator. He was always radical and supported the election of Grover Cleveland.

BRAZIL ALSO HAS VOLCANO

Rio de Janeiro, May 14.—Brazil is experiencing its share of seismic disturbances, a new volcano having suddenly made its appearance at Podo d'Anta. In the State of Minas Geraes. The town of Podo d'Anta was built at the base of a high conical hill, which was covered with trees to the summit. A short time ago the inhabitants were awakened by a terrific detonation. Rushing from their houses they discovered that the top of hill had been blown away, leaving a great crater, from which smoke and flames were issuing. The course of the River Conquistador which flows past the town, was completely changed by the thousands of tons of earth that filled the original channel.

MAN MURDERED IN A BOX CAR AT ECHO

Echo, May 14.—A passing freight on the O. R. N. was found to be on fire and was sidetracked at Foster, three miles north of here. One man was burned to death and two horses were killed. The man is supposed to have been murdered. Two other men were in the car, one a soldier who is being pursued by a sheriff

posse down the Umatilla river. The other man will in all probability be apprehended at Umatilla.

Later—The soldier has been captured at Umatilla and the coroner is holding the inquest. So far nothing has been found to give any clue as to the identity of the murdered man.

FEW CASES OF DISEASES IN 'FRISCO

San Francisco, May 14.—A cloudy sky and a cold rain dampened the spirits of the homeless thousands this morning. Despite the weather, there is an increase in the number of men at work on the debris and repairs of the temporary structures progresses rapidly. Daily rations are now being issued to 164,000, over a hundred thousand more than last week. But of this number more than seventy-five per cent are really able to support themselves at the fifteen cents a meal houses. However, the destitute will have to be fed. Health conditions are very favorable. At Golden Gate not a single case of typhoid fever is known. At Oakland there have been few deaths from pneumonia. Chinese from Berkeley are being transferred to Oakland and everything points to a concentration of camps.

LABOR STRIKE AT ST. PETERSBURG

St. Petersburg, May 14.—May workmen have struck today. Work of every description is at a stand still and the police have been stationed in the suburbs to prevent strikers from entering the city, where they might cause considerable turmoil.
