Governor Chamberlain in his speeches

Looses on Saturday Because of Up Good Game on

GH SCHOOL CAP

Grande won its first game with Walls at the later's grounds last day. The Walls Walla Union gives a creditable write-up of the game.

Chamberlain claims credit for loaning of the school funds. It is a well known fact that this was made possible by the enactments of a republican legislature which reduced the rate of interest so as to compete favorably with private loan funds, and also authorized the investment of the school money in bonds of stated kinds.

There are two causes which made the loaning and investment of the funds possible and at present there are over \$300,000 covered by interest bearing bonds. Aside from these considerations Chamberlain is but a minority of the board which manages the school fund and it is the height of arrogance for him to assume the credit of its record. Any man but a democratic demagogue would be ashamed to make such a claim.

THE GREAT THINGS
Chamberlain boasts of the great things he has done at the penitentiary but he fails to acknowledge that he was provided with funds to do it with by a generous republican legislature, the members of which recognized that the institution had been neglected too long on account of the perverseness of factionalism, which dictated the punishment of Governor Geer by refusing to listen to his recommendations and made the necessary provision to put the buildings in shape.

AN EXPENSIVE REIGN
The legislature of 1903 placed at Chamberlain's disposal sufficient money to not only put the buildings in shape, but to enable him to fit up the dwelling place of his appointees luxuriously. These things were done by a republican legislature, under the recommendation of republican committees, yet our democratic governor takes the credit for them. Chamberlain's administration of the penitentiary has been the costliest in the history of the state by several thousand dollars. The figures are available.

CALIFORNIA REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

Santa Cruz, Cal. May 14.—Republicans from all parts of the State are gathered here to attend the Golden Jubilee celebration in honor of the Fiftieth anniversary of the first national Republican convention. This celebration is to be held in connection with the fifth annual convention of the State League of Republican Clubs of California, which opens in Santa Cruz Casino Hall today and will last two days. There was a short business meeting this forenoon and in the afternoon the Union League Club of Stockton, will present an oil portrait of Gen. John C. Fremont, the first Republican nominee for President. This will be followed with greetings to the pioneer Republicans who voted for Fremont in 1856.

Tomorrow there will be a reception to the veterans of the Mexican, Civil and Spanish-American wars. This will be followed by exercises commemorating the services rendered to the party by distinguished national and State Republicans. Tomorrow afternoon there will be a meeting with short speeches, general business, election of officers and election of delegates to the National League Convention. In the evening there will be a social function at the San Beach Hotel in honor of the retiring and the newly elected officers.

The diennial convention of the National Republican League will be held in Philadelphia and on that occasion the fiftieth anniversary of the birth of the First National Republican Convention will be celebrated.

NEWFOUNDLAND SEALING GOOD

Toronto, Ont., May 14.—Reports just given out by the Government show that the Newfoundland sealing fishery has been a great success. Last year the catch was 174,000. This season over 300,000 were killed. An experiment was made this year with a powerful iron ship, and the ease with which she smashed her way through the ice and enabled the hunters to get closer to the sealing grounds has marked a new departure in the methods of an industry which is the great event of the early part of the year in Newfoundland and is said to give employment to 5,000 men.
