LORD CROMER'S REPORT.

(Scripps News Association)
London, May 14.—The Earl of Cromer's annual report upon Egypt and the Soudan has just been issued. In the light of the and told of the great necessity of good dispute between Egypt and the Porte special interest attaches to a detailed statement on the barbarism and degradation pravailing among the tribes in the Sinal Peninsula and the efforts made to introduce more human usages and better order. The measures taken include the srection of barracks and organization of police, while a telegraphic line and road for motor carts are projected. The economic condition of the country is declard to be good, and Lord Cromer says there is every reason to believe that the steady and uniform rate of progress will he maidtained in future years, but nowhere must there be undue haste.

As to the Soudan the population is estimated at 1,853,000, including a conjectural figure of 400,000 for the Bahril-Gazal. The labor question in the Soudan already presents considerable difficulties. and these difficulties are likely to increase as if time goes on. The rate of wages has risen everywhere, and demand, both on the part of Government and of private

individuals, is greater than the supply. During the past year only one slight accident occured to a European. An officer was charged by a leopard, which he had mortally wounded, but after receiving some severe bites, he managed to throttle the animal with his hands. Among the natives who are less well armed, accidents are more frequent. Mr. Butler reports the case of an Arab who yttacked a lion with only a spear, a and killed it ed by a blow delivered sumiltaneously by the paw of the animal. The report concludes with the warning that if the Scudan is to be effectually reclaimed from savagery, there must be no undue haste. The progress of the Soudan depends upon steady, continuous, unosternatious and combined efforts along the lines of a well defined policy, from which there should be no divergence.
