COMMUNICATION

La Grande, Ore. May 17th, 1906.
 To the Editor:—Permit me space in the columns of the Observer to make a statement regarding the controversy over the election of a Councilman from the Third ward which resulted last evening in the election of Mr. Meyers.

In the first place I desire to state that the position of Councilman was not of myseeking. When some of my friends first came to me and suggested that I be a candidate for the position, I absolutely refused to consider the proposition, and remarked that I would stand the City a law suit before I would accept it.

Afterwards, however, upon the representation of my friends that Councilman Dunn was in favor of my election and would support me, I finally stated that, if Mr. Dunn would promise me that he would support me that I would be a candidate. I saw Mr. Dunn and he agreed to support me. I told him that I would not get into the fight unless I knew that I could depend upon his support as I did not care enough for the position to get out and make a fight for it. He said that I could depend upon his support and that all he would ask of me would be to get up a Petition signed by voters of the ward assigning as a reason that if another Candidate should enter the fight supported by a Petition that it would put him in an embarrassing position.

My friends immediately commenced to circulate a Petition in my behalf which was signed by ninety voters of the ward before Mr. Meyers came out as a Candidate. The Petitions on file with the City Recorder show that ninety three persons signed my Petitions and only fifty one signed Mr. Meyers Petitions including eleven that signed both Petitions.

I desire to state further that had Mr. Dunn stated to me that he would support me in the event that Mr. Meyers was not a candidate but that if Mr. Meyers was a candidate that he would have to support him for financial, business or political reasons that I would not have been a candidate.

Mr. Dunn's promise of support to me was as definite and unqualified as one man could make to another. He simply stated that he would like to have me get up a petition for his own protection.

But outside of any promise what excuse can Mr. Dunn give for not recognizing the petitions of the voters of the third ward?

When Mr. Carr was elected Councilman from the first ward in the face of a petition for another candidate, some of the supporters of Mr. Meyers in this fight howled the loudest about the outrage of ignoring the petition. "Verily, it makes a difference whose ox is gored."

In conclusion, I will state that I sincerely hope that "Whangdoodle Bacon" who was instrumental in bringing Mr. Meyers out as a candidate for councilman and precipitating another "Bank Fight" is satisfied with my defeat and will let his muck rake rest for awhile.
