CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT UPON WHICH WE VOTE

Read These Over Carefully and Then Read them Over Again You Must Pass Judgment

Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be, and hereby is, amended by inserting the following section in said article IV after section 1, and before section 2, and it shall be designated in the Constitution as section 1 a of article IV:

Section 1 a. The referendum may be demanded by the people against one or more items, sections, or parts of any act of the legislative assembly in the same manner in which such power may be exercised against a complete act. The filing of a referendum petition against one or more items, sections, or parts of an act shall not delay the remainder of that act from becoming operative. The initiative and referendum powers reserved to the people by this Constitution are hereby further reserved to the legal voters of every municipality and district, as to all local, special, and municipal legislation, of every character, in or for their respective municipalities and districts. The manner of exercising said powers shall be prescribed by general laws, except that cities and towns may provide for the manner of exercising the initiative and referendum powers as to their municipal legislation. Not more than ten per cent of the legal votes may be required to order the referendum nor more than fifteen per cent to propose any measure, by the initiative, in any city or town.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Section 1 of article XII of the constitution of the State of Oregon shall be, and hereby is, amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Laws may be enacted providing for the state printing and binding, and for the election or appointment of a State Printer, who shall have had not less than ten years' experience in the art of printing. The State Printer shall receive such compensation as may from time to time be provided by law. Until such laws shall be enacted the State Printer shall be elected and the printing done as heretofore provided by this constitution and the general laws.

With regard to the "Precipitation of a Bank Fight" which appears to haunt a few of our citizens and who seem to construe the smallest action taken by any person connected with either of the National Banks of this city as certain to culminate in what they term a "Bank Fight," I regret that the day and night dreams of these persons are so full of this bugbear. For myself I cannot believe that any intelligent or fair minded citizen will consider my business as a barrier to my taking an active interest in our city's affairs. I have lived here for sixteen years and paid taxes for a great portion of that time, have done what I could, in my humble way, to further any projects for our city's welfare which offered, and I sincerely trust that the "Bank Fight" "Holy Rollers" will see their way clear to permit me to continue in this course. In entering the council I have no object other than to serve the city conscientiously. I am tied in no manner, allied with no ring, and shall always exercise my best judgment in matters pertaining to the public service.

And now a final word with reference to the petitions of Mr. Knowles and myself, which were presented to the council. At least fifteen of the signers of Mr. Knowles' petition, which by the way was circulated almost before the office was vacant, stated that had they known of my candidacy, they would not have signed. I did not, as did Mr. Knowles, have a person, who by the way has been entirely free from the contamination of the "Bank Fight", give his entire time to the circulation of my petition, but nevertheless I feel confident that with very little effort a large number of additional signatures could have been secured.
