Portland, Ore. May 19.—A great "Made in Oregon" Fair, to be held in the street of this City, opened here today under the auspices of the Oregon Development League and with the support of the business men and citizens in general of this city. Only articles manufactured in this state and products raised in Oregon, are exhibited and the exhibition includes a large number of working displays and demonstrations of various home industries. The fair will last until next Saturday, May 26, and is attracting thousands of visitors from all parts of the State. An elaborate program has been prepared for the week, including a big street parade, which will be held next Friday and will be the climax of the fair week.

RED MEN HAVE THEIR DAY

Bristol, Pa. May 19.—The Red Men of this city and vicinity have turned out in full numbers to take part in the celebration of the thirty-sixth anniversary of the establishment of Mohican Tribe, No. 127 I. O. R. M. in this town. For weeks extensive preparations have been made for this event and it promises to be one of the greatest celebrations ever held in this city. The town began to fill with visitors from the surrounding districts early this morning and large delegations of Red Men came from Philadelphia, Camden, Atlantic City, Trenton and other cities.
