The question of county division through the candidacy of Mr. Holmes is presented fairly and squarely to the voters of this county. There is no other issue represented in the campaign for the office of representative to which the three aspirants are seeking. Mr. Holmes, Mr. Rothchild and Mr. Haworth have subscribed to statement No. 1 which means that they each are honor bound to support the candidate for United States senator who receives the greatest number of votes, whether it be Mr. Bourne or Mr. Gearin. This eliminates the political issue, and the only issue that remains is the question of county division and upon this issue we find two candidates against division and one in favor of it.

Those who favor division will present a solid front in supporting Mr. Holmes.

Those who are against division at the present time are divided, some will vote for Mr. Rothchild and some for Mr. Haworth. It requires no prophet or seer to see the danger of such a policy. Those who are against division must line up and unite upon one of the two candidates and deal such a crushing blow to the division idea that it will be silenced for all time to come.

The question for the anti-divisionists to decide is which of the two candidates can secure the greatest number of votes and when elected can be expected to accomplish the most.

Owing to the fact that Mr. Haworth belongs to the dominant party in this state, the party which will organize the legisla-

ture; hold the majority and name all the committees; will certainly be in a position to do more for his constituents than Mr. Rothchild who if elected would be in the minority and receive scant recognition.

Mr. Haworth for a number of years has been closely allied with the laboring men of this state and will be joined by strong men from other sections of his state who will be glad to pool their mutual interests.

The legislature is fully aware that Union county under normal conditions is Republican and should we send M. Rothchild it is not natural to expect that a Republican legislature would stand in with him and permit him to return home all covered with glory. Is that the way of politics? No and all who know anything about the working of the legislature know this. Therefore the proper thing and the only thing for the anti-divisionists of the county to do is to throw their solid support to Mr. Haworth who from every standpoint is a much stronger man than Mr. Rothchild.

Mr. Haworth is loyal to the best interest of the county as was attested a few days ago. He was willing to waive his own personal interests, and when the same proposition was put up to Mr. Rothchild he refused.

The people all over the county are considerably agitated over the county division. This is proper, when the people as a whole think they generally solve such problems for the benefit of the whole.
