A NEW O. R. & N. TRAIN

Upper Columbia River Given Service That is Appreciated.

The new local Upper Columbia River Train put on by the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, May 20, will do much toward attracting tourists to points along the river between Portland and The Dalles. The new train, leaving Portland as it does, at 8:15 A. M., and arriving at Portland at 6:00 P. M., the same day, gives one an opportunity to spend the day at some of the delightful places along the Upper Columbia River, and permits them to return home the same day.

The train is made up of baggage car and coaches, and stops at all points in both directions so as to accommodate local travel as much as possible. The lightness of the train, however, permits it to run at a high rate of speed between stations, so that even with the stops, good time is made.

There are many beautiful places along the river, such as, Roosted Rock, Latourville, Multnomah Falls, Bondeville, at which a day's outing and picnic can be enjoyed to the uttermost and this new service makes it possible to take such outings, whereas, in the past, when the service has been performed by the heavy through trains, it has been possible to do this.

Columbia Southern Passengers instead of waiting at Biggs, which is unattractive, are taken to The Dalles promptly where they await the train for Portland, coming in on No. 1, as at present, or taking the local, as they may desire.

TRIP FOR MIDSHIPMEN

Washington, D. C., May 23—There was considerable talk of sending the midshipman to Europe this year, during their cruise on various ships assigned to the various ships assigned to the duty of taking them on a summer trip. Every now and then some one suggests that a visit to European waters will be an education, as well as a diversion, in the training of the midshipman at sea, but the Navy Department has never favored the idea, and does not now feel that any advantages would be derived from such a trip, although, of course, it would be enjoyable enough for the young men to go abroad.
The officers would find it more or less of a tax, how ever, since at the various ports touched by ships there would be certain obligations in the way of entertainment. This would mean great expense which most of the officers view with no special pleasure. It is held, also, that the summer cruises should be practical in all respects, and should be a part of the training of the midshipman. It would have quite another aspect if the midshipman were taken on a round of the European ports. The cruise will, therefore, be confined to home waters.
