NO DOUBT ABOUT DOBBIN

Friends of Jay H. Dobbin in Wallowa county have phoned his friends in this county that the Ledger Democrat, the only Democratic paper in Wallowa county, contains an editorial in which it states that if Dobbin is elected to the Legislature, he will not support Johnathan Bourne for U. S. Senator.

This is known to be an absolute misrepresentation of the facts.

That the voters of Union county may know where Mr. Dobbin stands in regard to the Senatorial election, it may be well to quote his own statement made on the streets of La Grande this week.

"If I am elected to the Legislature I shall vote for the people's choice for United States Senator as long as there is a chance of his election but should his cause appear at near the close of the session to be hopeless, in order that a United States Senator may be elected I reserve the right to vote for the man who in my estimation will best serve the state."

This statement was also made to Mr. Bourne's representative and other citizens of this town, long before the primaries took place. Mr. Dobbin states as to county division.

"I am frank to state to the voters of Union county that I stand exactly where I did two years ago. The voters of this county certainly know where I stood on the question at that time and there has been nothing to cause me in any way to change my position.

It is my belief that there is no need of a division of Union county and should I have a seat in the Oregon Legislature at the next session I shall take the position that the interests of the citizens of Union county will be best served if I exert my influence against any county division bill which might appear at that time."
