If the temperance people of this state permit the repeal of the local option law they will regret it. The way the proposed amendment appears on the ballot is misleading. "For amendment to the local option law, giving anti-prohibitionists and prohibitionists equal privileges." If this becomes a law the temperance movement in this state has retarded.

Our friends the Democrats are certainly a cheerful class. The last president they had, Mr. Cleveland, they classified as a Republican, and now they are claiming President Roosevelt is a Democrat.

Jay H. Dobbins is a man of his word and his position on county division certainly meets with the approval of eighty five per cent of the voters of Union county. He goes back this time with experience.
